Priest's Mother Present For His Ordination In Rome

The ordinations of the Rev. James C. McAniff, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard J. McAniff, No. 28 Normandy Avenue and the Rev. Elmer McNamara of Montezuma took place in the Chapel of the North American College in Rome on Tuesday, December 5 and were witnessed by Mrs. McAniff and her sister, Mrs. George W. Growney, Sr. of Webster Avenue. It was learned this week upon their return home from Europe.

Fathers McAniff and McNamara who completed their philosophy courses at St. Bernard's Seminary here and were sent to the North American College to finish their studies, were ordained with eight other young men from the United States by His Eminence, Cardinal Marchetti-Savaglini, Vicar General of the Pope.

Mrs. McAniff and Mrs. Growney sailed on November 25 in company with a party of ten mothers bound for the ordination ceremonies. On the day following the ordinations, they attended the first Mass of Father McAniff.

An outstanding event of their trip was their presence in St. Peter's, Rome, on the occasion of the canonization ceremonies of St. Bernadette Soubirous. Occupying prominent places in the great basilica they witnessed the entrance of the Holy Father, Pope Pius XI, and all of the impressive ceremonies marking the raising of Blessed Bernadette to sainthood.

On the following day, an audience was granted by the Holy Father to the mothers of the new American priests and the young priests themselves. His Holiness addressed the newly ordained particularly talking to them in Italian and then spoke a few words to the mothers. This was another event in the trip that will never be forgotten by the mothers of the young priests present to witness it.

While in Rome, Mrs. McAniff and Mrs. Growney were shown the places of interest by Father McAniff. They also met there John Reddington of 44 Alliance Avenue who was sent to the North American College last October and Robert McNamara of Corning who is studying for the priesthood there.

Many inquiries regarding the good health of Archbishop Mooney were received. The Bishop of Rochester is well known and highly respected in Rome especially at the North American College of which he was Spiritual Director for several years. His friends in Rome were deeply interested in his new responsibilities.

Mrs. McAniff and Mrs. Growney had pleasant voyages both ways. On the way over they were on the boat with Postmaster General and Mrs. James A. Farley. They returned to New York on January 4.
