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experiences in many fields of Catholic Action. Pleas for Tolerance He gave a vivid picture of the vital part Catholic culture plays in the arts, especially in the fields of music and literature. Making a practical and convincing plea for tolerance and a kindly effort on the part of Catholics to try to understand and co-operate with those of other religious beliefs in matters pertaining to a constructive program for intelligent use of leisure time, which changes in the American program of new economy will provide, the speaker urged his listeners to engage in intellectual pursuits preparatory to taking their place in such a new program.

A kaleidoscopic picture of the various practical ways in which a Catholic woman can participate was given by the speaker, and special stress was laid on the peculiarly helpful service to religion and religious truth that women can give. Father Mooney said:

"The new era with its increased leisure time due to the mechanization of industry is a challenge to Catholic women. The National Catholic Welfare Council is preparing for the proper use of these spare hours and suggests that more attention be given to intellectual activities by the Catholic world. Women have a great opportunity to lead the way in devoting this freedom from occupation to worthwhile channels."

Miss Cecilia M. Yawman, president of the Rochester Diocesan Council, N. C. W., presided at the business meetings held in the morning and after the luncheon in the afternoon. She also spoke briefly at the luncheon, giving to members a beautiful spiritual message of encouragement and inspiration. Mrs. F. W. Casper acted as secretary at the business meetings in the absence of Miss Katherine Doerbecker of Rochester.

Expressions of thanks were given to the Elmira newspapers for their courtesy to members of the N. C. W.; and Miss Doran, the toastmistress, expressed special thanks also to Station WESG, officials of which asked Miss Yawman to broadcast a brief message to the general public at 2:30, explaining something of the purposes and ideals of the N. A demand for better moving pictures was made in another resolution. In a letter sent to Will Hayes, director of the movie industry, the Council declared that the producers hold the key to improvement in the quality of films released for showing throughout the country. Members unanimously declared their intention of virtual discrimination against such theaters as persist in suggestive advertising and showing of films contrary to Catholic standards of virtue as applied to womanhood.
