

Opposition To Child Labor Amendment Explained at Meeting of Federations

A joint meeting of the Catholic Men's Federation and the Catholic Women's Federation was held last Sunday afternoon at St. Joseph's Hall. It was the most largely attended meeting that has been held by the two federations. The large attendance was believed due to the enthusiasm that prevails in regard to the coming national convention of the Catholic Central Union of America and of the Catholic Women's Union, and the national organizations of which the two local federations are the Rochester branches.

This bill would remove from the Federal Criminal Code the provisions that prohibit the circulation of information in regard to contraceptives and the use of contraceptives. The Federations also went on record in opposition to New York State Senate bill No. 65 and assembly bill No. 7 called the Walsh-Breen bill to ratify the so-called Federal Child Labor Amendment.
