TERA TO PROVIDE MILK FOR CITY'S UNDERNOURISHED SCHOOL CHILDREN

Temporary Emergency Relief Administration will furnish milk in the Catholic and public schools to undernourished children according to a report received by the Rev. John M. Duffy, superintendent of Catholic schools. Sixty-six and two-thirds per cent of this cost is to be defrayed by the State and the remainder by the city. School nurses under the direction of the Health Bureau have weighed the children in the school and found a large number underweight, which probably indicates that a great number of these are undernourished.

Children of families that are able to pay for one half pint of milk will be asked to contribute three cents a day for the milk. Those children of needy families will be given one half pint of milk a day free of charge.
