

Columbian Squires Movement Here Begins With 31 Charter Members

New Circle Named After Bishop O'Hern Instituted By Edward Dunn Memorial Circle of Elmira; Members Attend Communion Breakfast

Bishop O'Hern Memorial Circle, No. 115, Columbian Squires, was instituted, and thirty-one Catholic boys between the ages of 14 and 18 years became the first charter members at impressive ceremonies conducted by the Edward J. Dunn Memorial Circle of Elmira in Columbus Civic Center Building, Sunday afternoon.
