IN FILM PLOT STORY CONTEST

C. P. A. Board Acts To Encourage Movie Writing of Sound Literary Value

Augusta, Ga. — (NCWC) — The Catholic Press of the United States, brough action here today, took a further-stop toward olevating the moral tone of the motion pictures, while at the same time encouragingyoung writers with Catholic ideals to enter the field of motion picture authorship. By unanimous vote, the Executive loafd of the Catholic Press Associa-

ion, holding its winter meeting at the Bon Air-Vanderbilt in Augusta, voted to offer \$1,000 in prizes for motion picture plot writing. These will be \$500, \$300 and \$200, and will come from the Association's Literary Awards Foundation. Particuars will be announced later by the Literature Bureau of the Association.
