Reports of committees in charge of the recent bazaar held by the Men's Federation and Catholic Women's Federation were received as were those of committee chairmen preparing for the national convention of the Catholic Central Verein of America to be held in Rochester, this coming August.

Frank C. Hehlein, general chairman of the bazaar reported the affair successful. He reported that final returns together with proceeds of the Catholic Women's Federation card party would be almost sufficient to cover all expenses of the convention.

Committee chairmen's reports on the coming national convention indicated that the gathering will be one of the most interesting and most outstanding in the annals of the Catholic Central Verein.

A letter read at the meeting from F. P. Konkel, K.S.G., K.H.S., director of the Central Bureau of the Central Verein of America called attention of the Federation to the Friday evening broadcasts of the National Broadcasting Company in opposition to the so-called Child Labor Amendment.

Mr. Konkel urged listening to these broadcasts and emphasized the importance of making known to the general public the true nature of this so-called proposed Child Labor Amendment. He referred to the confusion prevailing in many quarters and to the utter lack of appreciation by a large section of our people of the evils that are bound to follow ratification of this proposed amendment.

He requested members to do all they can to have ratification of the proposed amendment by the State of New York, defeated.
