

REFORM OF SOCIAL ORDER UP TO STATE SAYS MSGR. JOHN A. RYAN

St. Louis.—(NCWC)—The current dominance of extreme individualism places the responsibility for social reform largely on the State, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John A. Ryan, of the Catholic University of America, Director of the Social Action Department, National Catholic Welfare Conference, declared here Sunday.

in the course of an address delivered before the Young Men's and Young Women's Hebrew Association of St. Louis.

Declaring that "the guilds and other subordinate societies and institutions which once formed an integral part of the political and social order have long since disappeared," Monsignor Ryan said that "this intolerable condition," he added, "can be ended only through the substitution of a new social order, a new kind of state."

Continuing Monsignor Ryan pointed out that the Holy Father, however, emphasizes that "the State should not usurp industrial functions which can be adequately performed by individuals, nor take on activities which can be efficiently carried on by smaller societies."

"He demands a graded hierarchical order," he went on, "that is a series of subsidiary industrial groups or associations forming an organic part of the political and social order and exercising within their own limited field real public authority."

The Pope's program, Monsignor Ryan declared, is "particularly calculated to eliminate conflicts between the two great industrial classes." To remedy class antagonisms, he asserted, "intelligent social reformers" have been advocating what he called "industrial democracy." It is urged, he added, "that labor obtain a share in the management of industry, in its profits and in its ownership."

Monsignor Ryan asserted that "our existing economic arrangements are a mixture of industrial anarchy and industrial despotism" and that the Holy Father "would substitute order and organization." "Between the state and the helpless individual," he added, "he would institute a self-governing economic body or group clothed with the power to manage industry rationally and sharing some of the political economic functions which are now ineffectively performed by the state."
