## **Speaks To Women Of Elmira Heights**

Elmira-"The Prince of Peace" was the subject of an address given by Miss Carolyn Ruth Doran at a Communion breakfast of the Sodality of Our Lady and the Rosary Society of St. Charles' Church held in the church hall, Elmira Heights, Sunday morn-

Miss Doran's talk was based on Catholic womanhood, dealing with beauty and peace attainable by those who live the ideal life of Catholic womanhood. "Organization work," she continued, "is important for promotion of Christian virtue as applied not only to religious and spiritual expression of women, but also as applied to their occupational and recreational existence.

"Women who seriously determine to live Catholic life in its fullness soon realize, the beauty and great gift of peace within them that is their reward even in this life from the Prince of Peace."
