

Archbishop Mooney Gives Endorsement To Holy Name Activities In Diocese

The mid-winter activity of the Rochester Section of the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union was a Spiritual Bouquet offered by the Holy Name Societies on the second Sunday in January at which 6,151 Holy Communions and Masses were offered for the intentions of the Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney, Bishop of Rochester.

Diocesan Holy Name Union Will Meet in Geneva, Sunday, April 8

Convention To Open With Solemn Benediction; New Constitution Embracing Diocese To Be Considered; Summer Rally Will Be Planned

The second annual convention of the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union will be held in Geneva on Sunday, April 8. This announcement was made last night by headquarters of the Union in Rochester.

The convention will open at 2:30 p. m. with solemn benediction of the Blessed Sacrament in St. Francis De Sales Church, Geneva, and the business session will follow immediately after in St. Francis Hall.

One of the most important matters to come before the convention will be consideration of a new constitution for the union, setting up deanery unions and auxiliary organizations to the diocesan union. The program will also include discussion of plans for a summer rally of the Holy Name societies of the diocese, and discussion of ways and means for further spread of Holy Name work. There will also be an address by a speaker of national prominence in Holy Name affairs whose name will be announced shortly.

The Union embraces all Holy Name societies in the more than 150 parishes included in the 12 counties comprising the Catholic Diocese of Rochester. Each Holy Name society in the diocese is entitled to send four delegates and its Spiritual Director to the convention.

Present officers of the Union are: Edward Shlesinger of Rochester, President; William G. Wynn of Charles J. Knapp and Norman V. O'Brien, all of Rochester; William McKane of Auburn, Thomas E. Biekle of Geneva, T. Francis O'Dea of Elmira and Richard McElligott of Corning. Vice-Presidents: Roy W. Crisy, Rochester. Vice-President and Secretary: Andrew Wuest, Financial Secretary: Joseph Antolina, Treasurer and John W. Ditzinger, Marshall, the latter three all from Rochester.

The Union was established in March 1932 when the late Bishop John Francis O'Hern appointed the Rev. F. William Stauder, pastor of Holy Redeemer Church, Rochester, as Spiritual Director of the Holy Name in the diocese and suggested that the various Holy Name societies of the diocese seek some means for closer cooperation. Father Stauder now has for his assistants in the spiritual direction of the Union, Rev. A. F. Florack of Rochester, Rev. L. A. Jones of Auburn, Rev. L. W. Cannon of Corning, Rev. D. A. McCarthy of Elmira and Rev. J. J. Healy of Geneva.

Since its formation, the Union has sponsored two great Holy Name rallies in Red Wing stadium at Rochester at each of which over 12,000 men were present. It operates a speakers bureau, publishes a bulletin of Holy Name activities throughout the diocese and in other ways acts as a medium for the interchange among the various Holy Name societies of the diocese of ideas that have proved successful in Holy Name work.

St. Boniface Wins Col. Biel's Trophy In Knights League
