"IS IT I, LORD?"

We quote from the March meeting of the national president of the National Council of Catholic Women, Miss Anne Sarahon Hooley: "As we follow the mind of the Church into the Via Crucis of these days, we are enveloped in its somber mood. All the poignancy and the mourning of liturgy seeps into our souls. And perhaps its most piercing words are those of Judas, the betrayer of his Master, asking the question, 'Is it I, Lord?' "We enter the Garden of Olives and in the midst of our worldly distractions, hear again, from The Gate of Gethsemane the reproach of the Lonely One. "Couldst thou not watch one hour with me?" Disconsolate and with aching hearts, we follow the condemned Jesus along the road to Golgotha. We pass the sorrowing Mary, we hear His consolation to the women of Jerusalem, 'Weep not for me, but for yourselves and for your children, we shudder at the ignominy of His journey, and finally, we stand before Him Crucified. Fixed to the Cross by nails of sin which men would offer Him through all the days to come! What men! Well may we hear the echo once again 'Lord, is it I?' "We kneel at the foot of the Cross, and as the cup of gall is lifted to His lips, He turns His bleeding head and looks into its depths. Across the centuries, and down the misty years, He sees a woman. He hears her speak. 'I cannot do the thing you ask of me, she says. 'I have a family, my duties, cares, and even my charities. You bring me a plea from Peter's Chair that I shall labor in the Lay Apostolate, that I shall study, work, prepare to know the faith I own in order then to share its beauty and its courage with all men. You may be right. Undoubtedly, it's needed in these changing broken days when men do hunger for such radiant joy. But you must find some other woman far less busy and less occupied than I. Besides, it's all so strange to me, and I've no time! "The Saviour, knowing He had mounted Calvary's heights to purchase for this woman her gift of faith, but in His omniscience, aware that time would make her see, would stir her love and generosity, would find her learning that her task was now, still confident unto the end, He bowed His Head and died. "Lord, is that woman I?"

We have been honored this week with the presence at the monthly meeting of the Rochester Diocesan Council of our Bishop, Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney. We know that his encouraging words are going to prove a stimulus to the activities of the Rochester Diocesan Council.
