

That the girl of today makes the woman of tomorrow has been recognized by Catholic leaders as evidenced by the growing Catholic Youth movement, which is reaching out to the Catholic girl.

Catholic women's organizations and the Catholic Action Sodality of Our Lady are proofs of the young girl's participation in Cathloic activities; her responsiveness to the suggestions of Catholic clergy and lay leaders; Her willingness to cooperate in religious and civic affairs. The Catholic girl of today has ample opportunity to become a woman equipped with a living knowledge of her faith and an influence for good in her community.

Commending the Catholic Youth Movement for what it is doing for the Catholic girl, at the same time The Ave Maria sounds this note of warning: "We trust that it will not spend itself entirely on grown girls who are poor and have to work for a living, on young girls who have not the advantages they would have if their parents were rich. Poverty is not the curse it is thought to be and virtue often follows it. Catholic girls who happen to be born in rich surroundings need the cooperalive Youth Movement, not to sustain but to restrain them. They are hard to reach, it will be objected. Yes, but they can be reached by their class who are in the movement. This is not to be interpreted as in any sense a stricture on the tide which is turning toward Catho. lic girls. It is merely a suggestion to make it inclusive enough to reach the poor little rich girl."
