Maternity Guilds Draw Praise From Archbishop Stritch

Milwaukee (N.C.W.) - Lauding Maternity Guilds, organizations of Catholic women for the purpose of helping expectant mothers and maintaining the Catholic ideals of motherhood and family life...

Archbishop Stritch said the Guilds, to be organized in parishes by mothers and friends of the mothers, would help their members "to appreciate Catholic teachings, especially as expressed in Pope's Pius XI's Encyclical on Christian marriage; to develop a morale among Catholic mothers; to tell the world that there is a group of Catholic mothers courageous enough to stand in opposition to modern degeneracy, still loyal enough to the cross of Christ to be willing to carry it into the shadows when bearing it means adherence to Christ; to make possible the lightening of the burden which comes at certain intervals in family life."

Through the Guilds, the Archbishop said, he believed it possible to build up in every parish a maternity endowment, a blessing because of the help it would give to the mothers of the parish. It must be wide and catholic, he said, and envision the needs of all the poor in its district, and not of its members alone.

"I hope the day will come," the Archbishop said, "when the endowment will make it unnecessary for any Catholic mother to go to any other than a Catholic hospital. I do not suppose the founders of this movement realize fully what it is destined to be in the Catholic life of the land. It is going to be a great thing."

Fish is rich in protein and in minerals and the salt water fish and shellfish are especially rich in iodine. According to tests made by the Department of Agriculture salmon, cod, haddock and sea herring are special sources of vitamins A and D, which are preventives of many diseases.
