ment shall be submitted to the people for adoption, and be made part of the organic law of the State of New York.

MOTION PICTURES

We renew our resolution of one year ago in regard to motion pictures and motion picture theatres. We request our members to refrain from attending motion picture theatres that persist in advertising and in showing gangster, racketeer and sex appeal pictures.

FEDERAL CHILD LABOR AMENDMENT

We are opposed to ratification by the State of New York of the so-called Child Labor amendment to the Federal Constitution. This proposed amendment would give to the Congress of the United States the absolute and unqualified power to limit, regulate and prohibit the labor of persons under eighteen years of age.

Under the influence of present unsettled conditions and of the NRA, an intensive campaign is being waged to bring about ratification of the amendment.

We are uncompromisingly opposed to the sale of child labor. We are not unmindful, however, that a strong public opinion in the several States has been expressing these evils, and their presence will soon be a thing of the past.

about this much desired condition. We assert that adoption of the amendment would transfer to Congress powers which belong to parents and to the several States. It would be substituting the State for the parental authority.

ABSOLUTE DIVORCE

We warn our members that there has been for some years a growing tendency in New York State to liberalize our laws with regard to the grounds for the granting of absolute divorce.

For years it has been the proud boast of citizens of New York State that there was only one ground for absolute divorce in our state, namely, adultery.

We direct in particular the attention of our members to a bill now pending in the New York State Legislature and with rather bright prospects of passage unless immediate action is taken by those who would keep our state from becoming like one of the easy divorce states.

Our members should write their representatives in the Legislature at Albany strongly opposing this bill.

BIRTH CONTROL

We are unambiguously opposed to artificial birth control and to the making lawful the giving of information with regard to artificial birth control.

We are therefore opposed to the bill now before the Federal Congress known as the Pierce-Hasting bill amending the Criminal Code of the United States legalizing the giving of such information.

We believe that birth control is harmful to both soul and body and is cruel in the extreme.

OBJECTIONABLE MAGAZINES

One does not need to observe very keenly to see the low type of many of the magazines that are offered for sale on the newsstands of our city. It is therefore gratifying to note that Assistant District Attorney Fred J. Vander of Suffolk County has laid down the law to a local news agency and told the agency that such practice must cease in its country.

We commend the action of this prosecuting officer. We regard with pride that he has forced a list of some twenty-eight magazines characterized as obscene to be withdrawn from the newsstands of his county and not to be restored.

We recommend similar action by the prosecuting officers in the various counties of this country.
