**PRACTICAL TRAINING for a PRACTICAL WORLD.**

President of Rochester Business Institute  
Under the name "education" we have come to group certain types of study—mathematics, the sciences, languages, English literature. While acquiring a foundation in these subjects in secondary schools people also experience pleasant associations with friends in their own station in society.  
Is this enough?  
Most parents will agree with me when I say it is not. Practical life goes far beyond the chemistry laboratory, and a study of French. Since life also calls for contact with all types and varieties of personalities wider associations than those met in high school should be included in early training.  
Please believe me when I say I have no difference of opinion with secondary education. Any changes I would suggest would vary little from present practices. The suggestion at this point is concerning the transition period between high school and "life."  
There is a modern type of training ideally adapted to this purpose. Methods used differ only from those in high school in that practical subjects and practical view points are substituted for theory. By this training the knowledge gained in high school may be given opportunity for practical expression.  
Better business training organizations today provide practical preparation for life at Rochester Business Institute students of all nationalities and creeds from many parts of the country provide a very typical background for business associations. About seventy-five boys will battle this week for supremacy in the Parochial Swim Meet in Columbus Civic Center pool. James Ehmann, who has charge of the meet, says that the number of boys entering the Meet has been steadily growing. A separate pennant has been obtained for this meet, and three bronze medals will be given to the winners in the three divisions. Here are the divisions: Class A, composed of boys weighing over 100 lbs.; Class B, of boys weighing between 85 and 100 lbs.; and Class C, of all boys under 85 lbs. This gives all a fairer chance than if rated according to classes in school. The events for each class are as follows: 200 yds. relay, 25-yard sprint, 100 yards free style, 50-yard breast stroke, 50-yard back stroke, fancy diving (front-back—and one optional dive).  
The Track Meet will come off on May 12, most probably at the old University Field. The number of applicants and popular demand forced Mr. Quinn to have the Meet out-of-doors. The postponed date is due to Catholic Scouts being needed in the Old Clothes campaign. There is also a special pennant for the Track Champions and three bronze medals for excellence in each of the three classes.  
Columbian Squires are beginning to organize a baseball team to enter the Municipal League. Besides having almost the whole of last year's Doud's Post American Legion team (one time Parochial Champions from St. Monica's), there are many other players who once pastimed in the Parochial League.
