Again active this year will be many who have been identified with Chest campaigns in an active manner since War Chest days of 1918.

Harper Sibley and Edwin Allen Stubbins are listed as associate general chairmen, Thomas J. Hargrave will head the special committee seeking those who give \$500 or more to the Community Chest.

Sol Heymann will take command again of the Individual Subscriber Division. He has headed this division for eight years, except for three campaigns when the post was taken over by William J. O'Hea.

Wesley M. Angle is again chairman of the Industrial Employee Division, while William R. Johnson heads the Commercial Employee Division for the second time. The Public Employees Division will be led by Harry B. Crowley.

Charles H. Vayo will recruit the forces of the Auditing Division with Irving W. Briggs an associate chairman. Ernest Pastore is chairman of the Publicity Division with Raymond H. Greenman as secretary of the Speakers' Bureau. Vilas M. Swan has been named chairman of the Complaint and Appeal Division.

All divisions have been mustering their forces in preparation for the campaign which improved business conditions give encouragement of being successful.

With the 1933 campaign inadequate to meet the budget set for the 47 agencies, it is hoped that this year's campaign will be well over-subscribed.
