

SEMI-CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION OF HOLY APOSTLES PARISH IS OPENED WITH MASS IN PRESENCE OF BISHOP

Solemn High Mass marking the opening of the observance of the semi-centennial of Holy Apostles Church Sunday morning, May 7, was attended by the Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney, Bishop of Rochester...

Archbishop Mooney occupied the episcopal throne with the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, vicar-general, as assistant priest. Officers of the Mass were: the Rev. William B. Connell, celebrant; the Rev. Walter A. Foery, deacon; the Rev. Eugen Goldinger, sub-deacon; the Reverend Edward M. Lyons, and Joseph Gefelli, deacons of honor; the Rev. Lawrence B. Following the services, Father Goldinger was host to the attending clergy at a dinner in the school hall. A series of activities conducted by parish societies were held throughout the week in celebration of the semi-centennial. The final event will be a Communion Breakfast for mothers and daughters of the Young Ladies' Society on Sunday, May 13.

Fr. Lane, Missioner In North Carolina, Will Speak Here

Members of the American Missionary Maids are making arrangements for an address on home missions to be given by the Rev. Howard V. Lane, pastor of St. Elizabeth's Catholic Mission, Elizabeth City, North Carolina, and formerly of this city, to be given Wednesday evening, May 16, in Holy Family Auditorium on Jay Street.

Father Lane will bring with him a set of motion pictures to be shown in connection with his talk. The films consist of a travel log of his large territory comprising six counties, 4,000 square miles in area with a population of 130,000 including 60 Catholics.

The pictures show many historical scenes such as the landing place of the first Sir Walter Raleigh Colony, the site of the Old Fort, the Lost Colony and the birthplace of the first white child born in the colonies, Virginia Dare. More recent historical events taking place in North Carolina such as the site of the first American airplane's flying are recorded on the films. Interesting scenes of the chapel, the people, congregations and general work done in the home missions are shown.

Father Lane is on a tour which will include giving his talk and showing the films in colleges, seminaries, and K. of C. Councils in Washington, Baltimore, Newark, New York, Brooklyn and Niagara.

Those who inspected the chapel car that visited here from North Carolina last year will find Father Lane's talk equally as interesting. He works with the Rev. Cornelius Murphy who is in charge of the missionary work in North Carolina and came here with the chapel car.

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Dramatic Contest Finals To Be Held Here On May 23rd

Finals in the third annual Western New York Dramatic Contest will be held in Rochester Wednesday evening, May 23, at Immaculate Conception Auditorium, Plymouth Avenue South, and Edinburgh Street, with Auburn, Rochester and Ithaca clubs competing according to an announcement made by Nazareth College Dramatic Club which is representing Rochester in the contest and winner of the first place in the semi-finals, held last week in Auburn.

Large audience at Holy Family Auditorium, Auburn, witnessed brilliant performances presented by the Nazareth College Dramatic Club of Rochester, the Little Theater Players of Auburn, the Ageco Dramatic Club of Ithaca and St. Bartholomew's Guild of Buffalo.

Major honors in the race for the dramatic title were awarded, by the three appointed judges, to the Nazareth College Dramatic Club, scoring a marking of 96 points, for their presentation of "Gloria Mundi" by Patricia Brown. Members of the Rochester cast included: Doris Weber, Jean Reynolds, Zella Lyons, and Eileen Burns of Nazareth College, Cleo Lochner and Cameron Switzer.

Scoring 93 points, the Little Theater Players of Auburn were awarded second choice for their enacting of "Smoke-screen," a one-act drama which won the Chicago contest in 1929. Third place was won by the Ageco Dramatic Club of Ithaca, sponsored by the Associated Gas and Electric Company which presented "Sons of the Soil," "A Mother's Influence" played by St. Bartholomew's Guild of Buffalo annexed fourth place.

Outstanding individual performances were numerous throughout the four plays and the judges experienced no little difficulty in making a choice. Honors for the best female performance went to Miss Helen Beardley of the Auburn Players with second place going to Miss Doris Weber of the Nazareth College Club. Cleo Lochner of Rochester who portrayed the role of the "doctor" in the play "Gloria Mundi" was the unanimous choice of the three judges for the best male performance.
