Progress In Instrumental Music In School Is Demonstrated At Aquinas

Great strides were noted in the advancement of instrumental music from an educational and cultural standpoint in secondary schools of Rochester diocese at a concert for priests and Sisters of Monroe County presented by the Department of Instrumental Music of Aquinas Institute Thursday of last week at Aquinas Institute.

The Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney, the Rev. John M. Duffy, diocesan Superintendent of education, the Rev. Joseph E. Grady, principal of Aquinas Institute, priests of the diocese and Sisters of the Orders of St. Joseph, Mercy, Notre Dame and St. Francis, comprised the audience for a program of demonstration of work done in Aquinas Institute department of instrumental music furnished by members of Junior and Senior Orchestras and Senior Band, directed by Raymond J. Hasenauer, School Director of Music. This department ranks with other departments of instruction at Aquinas and carries Academic credit with the approval of the Board of

Regents of the University of the State of New York.

Purpose of this concert was to demonstrate, particularly to those actively engaged in the field of education, what can and has been accomplished with a five year program in instrumental music under adequate supervision and with the proper motive. Even greater advancement can be made if orchestral work were begun in the grammar grades, and it is hoped by educational authorities in music that definite steps may soon be taken in developing an instrumental department in parochial schools.

Following the concert the audience was addressed by Mr. Hasenauer and Sherman Clute, supervisor of Instrumental Music in city public schools.

Robert J. Edelman Wins Nazareth Hall Oratorical Contest

Robert J. Edelman, senior of Nazareth Hall, will be presented the Most Rev. John Francis O'Hern Memorial Gold Medal for Oratory at Commencement Exercises, Thursday, June 21, as result of being judged winner of Nazareth Hall Oratorical Contest, held last Monday evening, in which five boys competed with second place going to Joseph F. Conway.

Speakers, in order of their appearance were as follows: "Christoph Columbus," John B. Byrne; "Frederick Ozanam," Joseph F. Conway; "Joyce Kilmer," Robert Edelman; "Thomas Dongan," Donald H. Newcomb; "Abraham Lincoln," James A. O'Neill.

The Rev. Benedict Ehmann, Emmet J. O'Neill, and Edward J. Lintz were judges of the contest. Father Ehmann, representative of the Rev. John M. Duffy, superintendent of Schools and spokesman for the judges, in announcing the decision, congratulated the participants, their parents, and faculty for the able presentation and expressed the hope that these boys will be the Catholic speakers of the future. Stating that it is difficult to choose one among excellences, Father Ehmann said that the judges had a hard task in deciding upon an outstanding speaker, since all the presentations were laudable.

Individuality, poise, perfect diction, proper articulation, and originality in mannerism marked the oratorical discourses of the five speakers who were a credit to their Alma Mater. Robert Edelman's talk was outstanding for the convincing and vivid manner in which he presented it; Joseph Conway won second place because of the pleasing quality of his voice and an attractive natural delivery. Honorable mention was awarded the remaining speakers. The contestants were all members of the eloquent class of Nazareth Hall which is taught by Sister M. Camilla.

Program closed with a Free Arm Drill given by the boys of the Seventh Grade dressed in white uniforms.
