Stressing the need of lay organizations participating in the work of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, the Rev. Michael J. Ready, Assistant General Secretary of the N. C. W. C., Washington, D. C., spoke to officers, executive board, members, and friends of the Diocesan and Local Councils of the National Council of Catholic Women at a special meeting in the Columbus Olive Center, June 10.

CARDINAL OF BOSTON LAUDED BY POPE PIUS

World Leaders Send Greetings To Prelate On Golden Sacerdotal Jubilee

Boston.—(NCWC)—Outstanding world leaders, headed by His Holiness Pope Pius XI, paid high tribute to His Eminence William Cardinal O'Connell, Archbishop of Boston, in messages felicitating the distinguished prelate on the golden jubilee of his priesthood, while the Catholics of Boston, in a great demonstration at Boston College on Saturday, massed to honor the Ordinary of this See.

Congratulations from the Holy Father, President Franklin D. Roosevelt, and President Eamon De Valera of the Irish Free State led the numerous messages received from many parts of the world as His Eminence celebrated solemn High Mass at the Boston College stadium and reviewed 50,000 parochial school children in the great outpouring of the Catholic laity to honor their Cardinal-Archbishop on his golden jubilee.

President Roosevelt, in his message, referred to the Cardinal as "a great churchman and great American citizen," adding: "I use this opportunity also to say that I wish a happy and prolonged career, with many years of continued good health."
