THE FIRST AQUEDUCT

From 1823 until 1842 the old Eric Canal was carried across the Genesee River about where Broad Street now crosses, by a wooden aqueduct faced with stone. This original aqueduct was completed when the easterly end of the canal was opened from Rochester as far as Little Falls.

On the occasion of the dedication of this aqueduct, General LaFayette came here to partake in the ceremony.

In 1842, this narrow and inadequate crossing of the Genesee River was replaced by the great stone aqueduct that now carries Broad Street across the river.

It was only eight years after the first aqueduct was completed that the Rochester Savings Bank started on its long career of service to this community. 
