**New Jersey Young Woman Is Received Into Carmel Order**

Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney, Bishop of Rochester, performed the ceremony of investing Miss Mary Eileen Hogan of West Orange, N. J., with the holy habit of the Discalced Carmelites at the Monastery, 151 Saratoga Avenue, on June 7. The Archbishop celebrated Holy Mass prior to the ceremony.

The novice in bridal costume, with a lighted candle in her hand, knelt at the grate during the Mass and the Ceremony. After Archbishop Mooney had asked the usual questions, the novice withdrew to lay off her worldly attire. The Psalm, "In exitu" was chanted and the novice returned wearing the coarse brown habit of the Order.

She received from the hands of the Archbishop, the girdle, scapular and mantle. She then prostrated in the Choir during the chanting of the "Veni Creator" and several prayers, after which she knelt at the grate and Archbishop Mooney announced the name she is to bear in religion: "Sister Mary of the Holy Ghost."

The Archbishop spoke a few words to those present. He said that various impressions were received at such a ceremony, but he felt that the one thing most evident to all was: renunciation. In such a life, it seems that almost everything is given up. The vows of Poverty, Chastity, Obedience in the older Orders of the Church, such as the Carmelites, re-tranched everything that appeals to nature. The one embracing this life must have a great spirit of faith, feeling God alone in all things and sacrificing all things for love of Him.

"It is hard for some to understand such a life, but we know from the story of Martha and Mary in the Gospel, that God commends it. He says: that Mary sitting at His Feet, wrapped in contemplation 'hath chosen the better part.' Prayer is the work of Carmelites; it is their obligation — by their prayer they glorify God and help the world. Let us thank God that we have them with us; to obtain God's grace and help for us by their life of prayer and sacrifice."

Mr. and Mrs. Albert J. Hogan of West Orange, N. J., parents of the novice, came for the ceremony and received Holy Communion at the Mass.

The Rev. Dr. Wilfrid Craugh was master of ceremonies for the occasion. Present in the sanctuary were: the Rev. Leo C. Mooney, chaplain at the Monastery; the Rev. William Brick, C. S. R., the Rev. John M. Duffy, and the Rev. Lawrence B. Casey.

**AQUINAS UNIT GIVES \$1425 TO MISSIONS, YEAR'S REPORT SHOWS**

The financial report of the Aquinas Institute Mission Unit for the year 1933-1934, just made to the Rev. Leo C. Mooney, Diocesan Director, Society for the Propagation of the Faith, shows a total sum of \$1775.05 raised during the year and a sum of \$1425.00 sent for Catholic missionary endeavor at home and in foreign fields, after necessary expenses were deducted.

**Fr. John Sellinger Is Named Legion's State Chaplain**

Official ratification of the appointment of the Rev. John M. Sellinger of Slager Band Post, Rochester, as State Chaplain of the American Legion, Department of New York, to fill the vacancy caused by the recent death of the Rev. James E. Duffy, Norwood, N. Y., has just been announced by the Department Executive Committee.

Father Sellinger, now pastor of St. Anthony's Church, Grotton, N. Y., served during the World War as Chaplain of the Seventh Field Artillery of the First Division in France and Germany and was awarded the Silver Star Citation Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster and the New York State Conspicuous Service Cross for gallantry in action. He has been a member of the Legion since its inception and served six terms as Monroe County Chaplain.

This year the Diocese of Rochester has the unique distinction of having three of its priests serving as State Chaplains of the three major World War Veteran organizations, The Rev. A. A. LeMay of Bath is State Chaplain of the Disabled American Veterans; the Rev. Charles J. Bruton of St. Margaret Mary's, Rochester, is State Chaplain of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and Father Sellinger is now State Chaplain of the American Legion.
