NCCW PLEDGES SUPPORT TO FILM DRIVE

Catholic Women Meeting In Auburn Name Delegates To National Meet

Support of the Legion of Decency in its current campaign to rid the motion picture of undesirable films was pledged by more than 100 Catholic women representing more than sixty Catholic women's societies at the quarterly meeting of the Rochester Diocesan Council, National Council of Catholic Women held July 28 at Holy Family Auditorium in Auburn.

Miss Katherine Doerbecker of Rochester was chosen to represent the diocese of Rochester at the Fourteenth Annual Convention of the National Council of Catholic Women, to be held in Washington, D. C., from September 29 to October 3, with Mrs. Richard J. FitzHarris of Rochester as first alternate, and Mrs. Joseph Barry of Auburn as second alternate. Mrs. T. A. Kane was elected to the office of Judge of the Election Board for the annual diocesan convention to be held in Rochester in October.

Presentations Given The celebration of High Mass by the Rev. Donald M. Cleary at Holy Family Church opened the day's program. Mrs. FitzHarris presided at the morning meeting held in the library of Holy Family School. Preceding the business session, Mrs. F. T. Curran, diocesan chairman of Committee on Constitution, presented the Diocesan Council with a gavel which had been the property of her father, Daniel J. Ganey.

At a luncheon in Holy Family auditorium which followed the opening meeting, the Rev. W. E. Cowen, D.D., pronounced the invocation. In the absence of Very Rev. John A. Conway, V.F., Father Cleary welcomed the assembled guests. Miss M. Irene Cooper, president of the Auburn Deansy Council, N. C. W. C., also greeted the delegates. Mrs. J. C. O'Toole acted as toastmistress.

Guest speaker at the luncheon was the Rev. William J. Cannon, pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Cato. Seated at the speaker's table with the guest speaker and officers of the Diocesan Council and the Auburn Deansy Council were: The Rev. Francis Waterstraat, assistant pastor at St. Alphonsus Church, Auburn, and Father Cleary, assistant pastor at Holy Family Church.

Vocal solos were rendered by Mrs. Jeannette Ogden of Auburn, accompanied by Miss Kathleen Plunkett. Mrs. Platt of Red Creek presented violin solos. Catholic Girl Scouts of Auburn served the luncheon, prepared by Lisabeth Brothers.

Responsibility For Placing Women In Public Life Rests On Other Women

One of the most used, and as it turned out, one of the most cogent arguments advanced for woman suffrage was that woman in public life would purify politics and promote civic virtue generally. Everyone knows that there was room enough for improvement when the question of giving women the vote was broached, declares an editorial writer in the "Lake Shore Visitor," Erie diocese official organ.

"Frankness compels one to note" continues the writer, "that Utopia has not arrived since women have gone to the polls. That is not written with even the remotest suggestion that women should be deprived of the equal rights which they have practically obtained or that they should be denied again the privilege of the polls. We write as a chronicler of facts not a critic of motives.

"Women as members of boards of censors have done a pliable job as the deluge of screen smut, shown with approval of the censors, demonstrates. Chinese Girl, Convert Sails From U. S. For Social Work In Orient

Washington — (NCWC) — Miss Chih-Ting Chi, Chinese girl who graduated from the National Catholic School of Social Service last June and who became a convert to the Catholic Church in the course of her four-year stay in this country, has left the United States for her homeland, where she will engage in medical social work. She sailed from Vancouver, B. C., on July 28.

Miss Chih-Ting Chi is a native of Peiping and was born a Protestant. She attended a missionary school through high school and junior college and finished her college course in the National College in China. She taught in a missionary school for a year and public school for four years. She came to America in 1930 and attended St. Benedict's College, St. Joseph, Minn., where she received a Bachelor of Arts degree

in 1932. In the course of her two years at St. Benedict's she was instructed in the Catholic religion and embraced Catholicism in 1932. That same year she matriculated at the National Catholic School of Social Service. She received her Master of Arts degree from the Catholic University of America this year.
