Maternity Guild To Be Explained at Open Mass Meeting

Mrs. Sophia Catherine Wavering, National President of the Catholic Women's Union, whose organization is holding its eighteenth annual convention in Rochester in conjunction with the National Convention of the Catholic Central Verein of America, will preside at the mass meeting in the ballroom of the Hotel Seneca on Tuesday evening, Aug. 21, at 8 p. m.

The principal address of the evening will be delivered by the Rev. Charles F. Keyser of Milwaukee, Wis. Father Keyser will discuss "The Maternity Guild."

The movement for the establishment of Maternity guilds was first launched by the Rev. Joseph J. Schagmann, C.S.S.R. in 1932. The purpose of the guilds is the opposition to the doctrines advocated by the supporters of the birth control movement and the dissemination of wholesome information contained in the Encyclical of the Pope, particularly the Encyclical on Christian Marriage, of Pope Pius XI.

Cured In Lourdes, Girl Will Enter Religious Life

The Paris Archdiocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes chanted a Magnificat as an act of thanksgiving for the miraculous cure of Helene Perdreau, a young woman of Paris, which occurred on the night of April 19, 1933, and has been officially recognized, writes M. Massiani, Paris correspondent, N.C.W.C. News Service. Abbe Belleney, Lourdes correspondent for "La Croix," tells of how he saw Helene Perdreau in a deep coma. Twenty-three years old, in seven years she had been a patient in nine hospitals. Tuberculosis had invaded lungs and intestines before meningitis developed, making it impossible for the patient to absorb some drops of Lourdes water. Dr. du Laurier, who was present, noted symptoms of imminent death. Some minutes later Helene Perdreau was cured while a priest and some women were praying aloud near her. The next day she was able to kneel at the Grotto. Since then her weight has increased about 30 pounds. Formerly a nurse in a Paris hospital, Helene Perdreau will follow the example of St. Bernadette, patroness of a Catholic girls' club to which she belonged, and enter the convent. She will enter the novitiate of the Sisters of the Presentation at Tours.

NATIONAL CONVENTION OF THE N. C. C. W.

On many occasions the Great White Shepherd of Christendom has issued to the Catholic laity a plea to come together in unity about "those centers of sound doctrine and multiple social activity constituted, aided, and sustained by the bishops." Annually, in pursuance of the spirit of this request, the National Council of Catholic Women calls its affiliated members in a general convention, the fourteenth of which is to be held this year in the Nation's Capital, from September 30 to October 3.

To give to this meeting a sense of its true dignity, a measurement, as it were of the unity and comprehensiveness of its scope, His Excellency, the Apostolic Delegate to the United States, will bring, through his kindly presence and his keen portrayal of the spiritual needs of the day, a message of light and encouragement. From the pontifical High Mass of opening to his own general address before the convention assembled and the closing banquet where he will preside, the Apostolic Blessing, the presence of the Vicar of Christ on earth will leave with each delegate a renewed consciousness of membership in the Mystical Body and of the essential oneness of the lay apostolate.

Home Life, Will It Be Saved?

"How many, or rather how few, there are who are harassed and worried because home life is fast disappearing from this land?" asked the Rev. Peter J. Bergon, C. S. P., in a recent radio address over the "Catholic Hour."

"Until we bring ourselves to face the problem and seek its solution, until we publicize the moral insecurity of a homeless nation, just so long shall we be sowing the seeds of our own ruin and destruction. . . . If a chain be as strong as it weak, the link certainly a country is as robust as its most delicate family. Families can and have existed independently of nations; but nations, and that amalgamation which we call Society cannot exist without families. . . . Devotion to duty, a noble regard for law—human as well as divine—the indispensable attitude of civility towards womankind, the safe-guarding of our tender young from the wiles and ruses of vicious angels of darkness—these quickly disappear from Society if its very care, the family, be cancerous. . . . Home was a novitiate where the beginner learned, not from beautifully touched counsel, but from practical experience, the necessary lesson of having religion as his strong arm in the conflict with the powers of darkness."
