Rochester's First Post Office

On November 19, 1812, Abelard Reynolds, with the aid of Colonel Rochester, received his commission as the first Postmaster

Among the furniture of Mr. Reynolds was a large desk of Among the turniture of Mr. Reynolds was a large desk or pine, 3½ feet in length, 2 feet wide, and 4 feet high. It had pigeon-hole compartments in the top, and two large drawers underneath, furnished with neat brass ringpulls. It was stained to resemble black walnut, and the sloping top was covered with black velvet trimmed with brass-headed tacks.
