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**Largest Entering Class In History of

**Four New Parishes Report;
Leaders Optimistic of
Success By Sept. 21**

Returns in the Holy Name Campaign for subscriptions to the Catholic Courier, this week, were encouraging in spite of the holiday. While somewhat smaller this week, it is expected by the leaders that next week's reports will show a decided increase in volume.

St. John the Evangelist, Rochester, continues to add to their total, having reported 210 subscriptions to date but St. Ambrose, Rochester, moved into second place. The balance of the first ten parishes reported last week continue in their same respective places. St. Aldysius, Auburn, however, moved up to eleventh place, reporting an additional 31 subscriptions for a total of 57 to date. St. Mary's, Elmira, also climbed the ladder, reporting 40 more subscriptions to make a total of 51.

Among new parishes reporting in the campaign this week are: St. Boniface, Rochester, 12; St. Francis de Sales, Geneva, 24; St. Stephen's, Geneva, 13; St. Lucy's, Retsof, 11; St. Patrick's, Victor, 13.

B. Edward Shlesinger, president of the Holy Name Union, was optimistic for success of the campaign this week after giving reports. Commenting on the week's results, he said: "While this week's report was smaller than previous weeks, we feel that it was due to the holiday and that increased activity will be shown by next week's report. The announcement of last week that the drive would be extended has brought favorable comment from several parishes which were unable for various reasons to organize the campaign during the month of August and undoubtedly many of the other parishes will be enabled to increase their totals by September 21."

**Highest In Scholarship In State
Margaret Beahon of Hubbell Pk.
Plans to Enter Nazareth College**

Attaining an average of 99.263 per cent in her studies at Nazareth Academy, Miss Margaret Beahon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Beahon, 26 Hubbell Park, won first place among the 750 students of New York State to whom scholarships were awarded by the State Department of Education at Albany.

Out of the twenty-five State scholarships annually awarded to high schools of Monroe County, eight were secured this year by students of Nazareth Academy and two by Aquinas Institute. Miss Beahon, valedictorian of the Class of 1934, was highest ranking student in the county as well as in the entire state. The second place in Monroe County was won by Miss Virginia Kupferschmid, salutatorian of Nazareth Academy's June graduating class, with an average of 98.526 per cent.

Other winners are as follows: Mary Katherine Pirogan, 97.684; Eileen Hayes, 97.388; Rita Doolin, 96.947; Evelyn Slavin, 96.157; Marion Schantz, 96.105 and Eleanor Stima, 96.105, all students of Nazareth Academy; John L. Keenan Jr., 96.210 and Vincent G. Zenkel, 96.105, Aquinas Institute.

Nazareth also won first place in Livingston County where Rita Scheldorn of Danville was awarded a scholarship on an average of 98.31 per cent. In Wayne County, Pearl Knitter, another Nazareth graduate, won second place on the scholarship list with an average of 95.26 per cent. Holders of the scholarships are en-
