Prominent Catholics Named on Human Needs Mobilization For 1934

New York—(N.W.C.)—His Eminence Patrick Cardinal Hayes, Archbishop of New York, the Very Rev. R. Marcellus Wagner, president of the National Conference of Catholic Charities; former Governor Alfred E. Smith and Mrs. Nicholas F. Brady are among 86 persons named by Newton D. Baker, chairman of the 1934 Mobilization for Human Needs, as a national committee to aid in the work.

The aim of the committee is to bring before the public reports of social conditions in American communities. At the invitation of President Roosevelt, the committee will open its session at the White House. Five hundred welfare workers have been invited to attend a conference in Washington, September 28 and 29.
