Topping the list of pinning platoons is the Catholic Bowling League ready to start the ball rolling one week from this Friday night.

At the present writing, President Barney Cahill has lined up seven teams for the 1934-35 season and is casting about for another quintet to round up the circuit.

A meeting scheduled for this Friday evening at Holy Redeemer's is expected to answer to the question of whether the league will start with eight teams or be forced to reduce its membership to six.

President Cahill reports that the following teams are ready for the race. Blessed Sacrament, St. Stanislaus, Holy Redeemer, St. Boniface, Corpus Christi, St. John and St. Andrew's.

Last year the Catholic League boasted of eight teams including the first six listed above along with the Columbus Civic Center and Holy Family.

Several meetings were held but they were unproductive of real results and rather than let inter-parish activity lapse, Cahill stepped out to bring about the formation of the Catholic League for another season.

It is a matter of keen regret that more general interest cannot be fostered in Catholic bowling activities.

Too long have the bowlers themselves sat on the sidelines and awaited for the appearance of some Moses to stir them from their lethargy.

In the last decade Catholic bowlers can point to the formation of the Catholic Bowling Association as their sole achievement.

It is to be hoped that from the experiences of the coming year will come some real lessons which, in the future, will eliminate the spectacle of the president of the Catholic League casting around for a team entry within ten days of the scheduled start of the season.

Bowling parallels basketball in the winter sports cycle and hence why not lend a kindly ear to the proposition of Clem Bayer of the C.Y.M.A.?

Clem managed the C.Y. boys in the Catholic Baseball League but his real sport love has been basketball. He strongly urged the formation of a court league of some kind last year and this year he's just as anxious to get things started.

Physical Director Presents Rules For Maintaining Health

Willbur E. Quinn, physical director of Columbus Civic Center continues his rules for maintaining health as follows: OLDER PEOPLE MUST BE MODERATE

"Older people especially should be most careful about making too rapid progress in reducing or putting on weight. Tissues harden with age and respond more slowly to treatment. The heart is less able to stand a severe strain.

"It is true. Perhaps I have gone further in my methods than others, because I have sought to give you the system and the explanation of the system."

"This is an advanced age. People don't merely want to be told to do something. They want to know why they should do certain things to attain certain objects.

Growth of Jesuit Mission Work In Century Is Cited

Paris Correspondent, N. C. W. C. News Service. Paris. — On the occasion of the celebration of the fourth century of the vow of St. Ignatius, some interesting figures on the work of the Jesuits in the missions have been published.

When, on December 3, 1833, Father Koothaan, Superior General of the Society, announced the re-summption of missions among the infidels, the Society of Jesus had only 2,000 members and could take charge of only two missions. A century later, it had 15,000 members, 2,950 of whom were engaged in evangelizing the infidels in 43 missions.

The world figure for souls entrusted to the ministry of Jesuit missionaries has reached 189,609,500 of whom 175,000,000 are Moslems or pagans, and 2,300,000 belong to different Christian confessions.

Among the Jesuit missionaries are 189 native priests, 260 scholastics and 161 Brothers. In 1933, a new novitiate was opened in India and another in Japan. One in Rhodesia is under consideration.

MISSION WORK IN CANADA Ottawa, (NCWC) — Canada's first week of mission study will be held at the University of Ottawa, October 6 to 9. The mission week will be directed by the Rev. Leo Deschatelets, O. M. I., as president, the Rev. Rene Martin, vice-president, and the Rev. Andre Guay, O. M. I., secretary.
