National Knights of Columbus Head Urges Participation of Councils In Public Celebrations of Day; Paul Muscarella Heads Joint Committees

Commemoration of discovery of America by Christopher Columbus in Rochester on Friday, October 12, will be observed jointly by the United Italian Civic League; Rochester Council, No. 178, Knights of Columbus; and independent Italian Societies of the city with special programs in Columbus Civic Center Building.

Rochester Man To Be Ordained In Divine Word Order

The Rev. Bernard Le Frois, S.V.D., of Rochester, will be ordained by the Most Rev. William D. O'Brien, Auxiliary Bishop of Chicago, and president of the Church Extension Society, Saturday, September 22, in the Holy Ghost Church, St. Mary's Mission House, Techny, Illinois.

Those who will receive Holy Orders in the Society of the Divine Word with Father Le Frois are the Rev. Andrew Dorfmeister, Chicago, and the Rev. William Fitzgibbon, Logansport, Ind.

Their first Mass will be celebrated simultaneously on Sunday, September 23. The Rev. Bruno Hagspiel, S.V.D., will preach the sermon.

Going from here to attend the ordination ceremonies of Father Le Frois, will be his mother, Mrs. J. LeFrois, Wimbeldon Road; two sisters, in the St. Joseph Order, Sister Alphonsa Marie, Wayland, N. Y., and Sister Rose Cecilia, Blessed Sacrament school, Mrs. Mary Kimmel and daughter, Dolores of Wayland will accompany the party from Rochester.

Another sister, a Missionary Sister of the Holy Ghost, Techny, Sister Jane, will also be present.

Father Le Frois will say his first High Mass at St. Boniface Church, Sunday, October 7, at 10:30 A. M. Assisting him will be the Rev. Merion Tourville, Vermont, deacon; the Rev. Theodore Winterroth, assistant at St. Michael's Church, sub-deacon; the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John F. Boppel, pastor of St. Boniface Church, assistant priest; and the Rev. George Schmitt, pastor, St. Anne's Church, master of ceremonies. The Rev. Charles Bruton, pastor of St. Margaret Mary's Church, will preach the sermon.

The Rochester Celebration is in charge of Paul Muscarella, general chairman. A banquet will be held in Columbus Ballroom at 6 o'clock and will be followed by a celebration in Columbus Auditorium at 8 o'clock.

Supreme Knight Carmody in his letter to Grand Knight Dr. Walter E. O'Neill states: "When we speak of a universal celebration of Columbus Day, we mean not only that every council of our order shall participate, but that councils everywhere do all they can to promote the general public celebration of the day."

Declaring that Christopher Columbus is a patron of the Knights of Columbus "not merely by chance selection but because his life and service, his unselfish spirit of self-sacrifice and his lofty Christian zeal represent in the highest degree the ideals of knighthood," the supreme knight says that "as though it were the first recognition of this event, every council of the order should, with zeal, spirit and enthusiasm and with appropriate function make noteworthy this year's Discovery Day."

Mr. Carmody concludes his message by calling attention to the fact that this year for the first time the nation will be called upon to observe Discovery Day by presidential proclamation, since last April Congress approved a resolution by which the President is requested and authorized to designate October 12 of each year as Columbus Day and to call upon government officials to display the flag of the United States on all government buildings.

India Natives For Clean Movies Says Missionary Here

Natives of Dacca and Calcutta, India, under the leadership of the Most Rev. Dr. F. Percier, S.J., and the Most Rev. T. J. Crowley, C.S.C., are staunch advocates of the Legion of Decency Drive against immoral films, Brother Severin, C.S.C., visiting relative in this city, told the CATHOLIC COURIER today. Pledge cards are being distributed and signed by thousands of Catholics and pagans, Hindus, Mohammedans and Geros, he said.

Brother Severin, a Holy Cross Missionary and former Rochesterian, is visiting at the home of his late father, Enos Smith, Marion St., after being in India for nine years. Because of ill health, following attacks of jaundice and malaria, he was recalled from the mission field and is on his way to Notre Dame, Indiana, Headquarters of the Holy Cross Fathers.

Stating that Rochester Catholics are fortunate in having Archbishop Mooney as their Bishop, Brother Severin told of meeting Archbishop Mooney in 1928, while he was Apostolic Delegate to India. He emphasized the high esteem in which the Archbishop is held by missionary workers of all religious orders.

For the first two years he was in India, he taught in the Decca High School, but for the remainder of the time, Brother Severin worked among the Gero aborigines living in the foothills of the Himalaya Mountains. First Gero woman was converted to the Catholic faith in 1912 and is still living; since that year, there have been over 8,000 baptisms and at present 1,000 catechumens are under instruction. In general these converts are faithful to their religion, the missionary said.

Eleven priests and five Mission Stations comprise the Gero Mission now, while in 1928 there was only one priest and one Mission Station. Brother Severin told the Bishop's Mission Club in a recent address Territory covering 31 miles in length with no way of travelling except on foot, bamboo huts having mud floors, poor food, consisting principally of rice and curries, no bread and the difficult Bengali language were cited as a few of the hardships confronting the missionary in northern India. It is liveable, the Holy Cross Brother said, because of the happiness of obtaining converts for God.

Just before he sailed for United States, Brother Severin had a brief visit with the Rev. Charles J. Young, C.S.C., former Auburnian and a graduate of St. Mary's Orphan Asylum here, who is stationed in the Bengalese missions. Brother Severin also worked with the Rev. C. F. Brooks, C.S.C., who was attacked by a lion in India about five years ago; and the Rev. Frank S. Wyster, C.S.C. who stopped in Rochester last February.

Legal Aid Society Asks City For Funds

Announcement was made today by Joseph P. MacSweeney, president of the Board of Directors of the Legal Aid Society that a request had been made to the City for funds with which to carry on the work of the Society and stated that unless the request was favorably acted upon, it would necessitate the discontinuance of the Society's service after December 31.

It has been impossible for the Community Chest from which the Society derives most of its support to bear the whole cost of this service to the poor and yet the Directors can find no possible way by which the service can be further curtailed or operating expenses further reduced in the face of the heavy demands for service made upon it by the unemployed and the dependent. Mr. MacSweeney said, "Our request has been made because we believe it to be a public as well as a private responsibility to provide the poor with an equal opportunity before the law."

When the Society faced a similar crisis last year, the city came to its aid by unanimous action of the council. The Society's request to City Manager, Harold W. Baker mailed today points out that the help given by the city last year enabled the Society to effect collections and savings for clients actually dependent upon city relief in excess of \$12,000 or over 10 times the cost of service to the Society.
