Regan; the President of the Alumnae Association, Miss Martha Bonham of New York City, and Miss Gertrude I. Blackstock of California, President of the Student Body. The delegates and visitors will be entertained at tea following the session.

Thirty-five of the fifty-five dioceses in which the Council is now organized will be represented at this meeting by their diocesan presidents. Many others are sending special representatives so that virtually every one of these diocesan councils will be represented.

Ann M. Nicholson, Ph.D., Field Representative for the N. C. C. W., and Miss Anna Dill Gamble, have sailed for Buenos Aires, where they will represent the National Council of Catholic Women at the International Eucharistic Congress which will be held next month.
