## The Home of Enos Stone

The first frame dwelling to be erected on the east side of the Genesee River was built by Enos Stone. It stood on South Avenue, about opposite the intersection of Broad Street. Here the family lived until it grew too numerous for the meager accommodation offered by the small house.

It was in the barn of Enos Stone, situated near the house, that the first school in Rochester was organized.
