Mrs. Looman said. The code chairman has registered a firm protest with the company responsible "whenever a picture has been rejected by our reviewers on moral grounds," she added. "In innumerable cases these protests were recognized and changes in name, titles and dialogue resulted. That some protests were in vain was due to the fact that public opinion was not aroused and, therefore, too many loopholes for the producers existed."

Mrs. Thomas A. McGoldrick, of Brooklyn, urged that the Legion of Decency broaden its campaign to include birth control legislation in Washington. If that were done with the enthusiasm that has marked the fight for better motion pictures, she said, "there would be no need for worry concerning such legislation."
