

Total of \$88,610.86 for Aquinas Brings Successful Drive to Close

Archbishop Mooney Expresses Personal Thanks To Pastors and People for Generous Response To Appeal for Catholic High School

Aquinas Institute, Catholic boys high school in the city of Rochester will carry on, it is assured by the successful campaign brought to a close Monday night in Columbus Civic Center Building with total pledges of \$88,610.86 reported and additional pledges coming in this week bringing in sight the goal of \$90,000 sought.

Although falling short of the objective of \$90,000 the grand total of \$88,610.86 exceeded by \$2,000 the actual quota of \$86,000 assigned to the various parishes.

The aim of the drive to raise \$90,000 for Aquinas Institute included a contingent fund of \$4,000 to take care of deficiencies and emergencies which might arise throughout the year. Pledges payable over a 10-month period and cash amounts received will be used to pay off current indebtedness and to maintain the school during the 1934-35 academic year.

Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney, Bishop of Rochester, speaking at the close of the campaign extended his personal thanks to the

pastors and workers for the completed roll call of parishes, bringing the ten day drive to a successful finish. Archbishop Mooney emphasized the importance of Catholic education and of the interest and appreciation in Aquinas Institute which had been stimulated through the campaign.

James E. Cuff was principal speaker at the opening of the drive. The Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, V. G., presided at the closing with Eugene J. Dwyer and Supreme Court Justice William F. Love, as speakers. Board and trustees of Aquinas Institute occupied prominent places on the stage Monday evening.

CENTRAL VEREIN BRANCH PLANS CREDIT UNION

The Catholic Central Verein of America, Rochester Branch, held a busy meeting last Sunday afternoon in St. Joseph's Hall. The final report of the General Convention Committee, was received showing that the convention was a huge success and that all obligations in connection with the running of the convention had been met.

It was voted to hold the patronal feast celebration at Holy Family Hall as near to December 8 as can be arranged. The Rochester Branches of the men and the women each year attend high mass in one of the German parishes, to celebrate the feast of the Immaculate Conception.

There was an interesting discussion of Credit Unions, and it is expected that within the next few months at least one credit union will be established by the Rochester Branch or by one of its affiliated societies. These credit unions are intended to help those wishing to borrow small amounts, but are not prevented from doing so by reason of the high rate of interest demanded by lending associations.

A resolution was adopted expressing the regrets of the society upon the death of George Gugel, who for a great many years was a zealous worker in the Central Verein, and recalling the many benefits received from his endeavors.

The resolution on Strikes and Lockouts adopted by the recent convention of the Central Verein held in Rochester, was taken up and discussed. The discussion was so active, that it was decided to make further discussion of the resolution the first order of business at the November monthly meeting. The resolution was printed in full a few weeks ago by this paper.

The resolution, it was pointed out, lays particular stress on the words of Pope Pius XI in his Encyclical on the Reconstruction of the Social Order, where he calls attention to the social and the individual character of ownership and of labor. "In the disregard of social responsibility by both capital and labor," says the resolution, "is to be found the great source of the serious strife that has arisen between capital and labor as between two contending armies."

It stresses the fact that capital and labor must be mindful of the fact that both the strike and the lockout are also subject to the moral law.

Film Censor Board Would Cost \$50,000 Says Father Lyons

"A Catholic Board of movie censors would cost approximately \$50,000," said the Rev. Roger Lyons, S. J., St. Louis, Mo., in an address on Catholic Action at Nazareth College, October 22.

"The Board would have to be made up of the best dramatic critics who could be obtained," Father Lyons stated. Even if that were possible, the Board would be severely criticized by Catholics if it were the least bit lenient in some cases. At present the ideal plan for handling the motion picture situation has not been evolved, the speaker said.

Father Lyons emphasized the "Legion of Decency as the one form of Catholic Action we are called on to participate in today." In fulfilling the pledges signed in the drive against immoral pictures, the speaker advocated adherence to the Chicago Council Legion of Decency list of motion pictures issued by the Queen's Work Sodality Service.
