Sorbonne Professor To Lecture at Nazareth

Etienne Gilson, eminent Catholic philosopher and Professor of Medieval Philosophy at the Sorbonne will give a series of lectures on new movements in Catholic culture at Nazareth College on November 16, 17 and 18. Professor Gilson, visiting Professor of Medieval Studies at St. Michael's College, Toronto, was at Harvard during 1928 and 1929 as Professor of Medieval Philosophy.

Professor Gilson, an outstanding authority on scholastic philosophy, is the author of *Les Meralities Chretiens*, *Moral Values and the Moral Life*, translated by Leo Ward, L. Thomasine (Philosophy of St. Thomas) and *Saint Thomas d'Aquin*. He is also the Editor of the University of Strasbourg's *Studies in Medieval Philosophy*.

New York State Supreme Court Renders Forceful Obscene Literature Decision

Among the resolutions adopted by the Catholic Central Verein of America at its recent convention held in this city was one entitled "The Campaign for Decency." This resolution, among other things, reads as follows:

"A more covert, and therefore all the more dangerous menace to decency threatens from certain circulating or lending libraries which make available books of a positively harmful nature. Under the pretext of promoting health education, volumes openly or covertly obscene are freely circulated. Others, under the misleading title of 'modern' novels, offend in many ways and do untold harm."

Those engaged in the campaign against the circulation of obscene books by these lending libraries have received much encouragement from a decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, second department, which is pointed out here by a member of the Rochester Branch of the Catholic Central Verein of America.

Complaint has been made that it is impossible to get a conviction against these lending libraries or that it would not be sustained by the higher courts if it was obtained. This forceful decision proves the contrary to be the case. The decision is as follows:

"It is admitted that the defendant loaned for a consideration a certain book. He was charged in the information with the crime of having in his possession, with intent to lend, an 'obscene, low, lascivious, filthy, indecent and disgusting book,' in violation of the provisions of Section 1141 of the Penal Law.

"On trial in Special Sessions the defendant was convicted and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 or serve twenty days in the city prison in default of payment. It is said that defendant paid the fine.

"The principal facts are not in dispute and the only issue is whether or not the book, as a mixed question of law and fact, falls within the condemnation of the statute as stated in the words of the information. Copies of the book were furnished on the argument for our examination in connection with making a judicial determination. It has been read. We can think of no reason any person of reasonably clean mind would have to read the book other than that arising by the imposition of a duty.

"We have no purpose to excite the curiosity of the prurient by naming the book—as might be desired by those interested in its publication and sale. It is sufficient to say that it is
