Complaint has been made that it is impossible to get a conviction

is impossible to get a conviction standard as well as that condemned against these lending libraries or that by the more precise and definite lanit would not be sustained by the higher courts if it was obtained. This forceful decision proves the contrary to be the case. The decision is as follows:

"It is admitted that the defendant loaned for a consideration a certain book. He was charged in the information with time crime of having in his possession, with intent to lend, an 'obscene, lewd laselvious, filthy, indecent and disgusting book,' in violation of the provisions of Section 1141 of the Pensa Law.

"On trial in Special Sessions the defendant was convicted and was sentenced to pay a fixe of \$100 or serve twenty days in the city prison in de-fault of payment. It is said that defendant paid the fige.

"The principal facts are not in dispute and the oraly issue is whether or not the book, as a mixed question of law and fact, fails within the condemnation of the minimite as stated in the words of the Enformation. Copies of the book were furnished on the argument for our examination in connection with making a judicial determination. It has been read.
