

Noted Philosopher Etienne Gilson To Give 3 Lectures

Etienne Gilson, considered by some "the foremost exponent of scholastic philosophy of the century. greater even than Jacques Maritain,' will give a series of lectures at Nazareth College on November 15, 16 and 17. Professor Gilson will speak on "Scholastic Philosophy and Modern Times."

He will also treat of the philosophy of the Middle Ages and the Renaissance, since he attacks philosophy from the historical point of view, relating any discussion of the modern philosophers to the medlevalists. In his survey lectures he follows up the two streams of medieval philosophy, that of St. Augustine followed by St. Bonaventure and that of St. Thomas Aquinas.

Professor Gilson, has received honorary degrees from Oxford, Aberdeen, St. Andrew's, Montreal, Milan and Collegium Angelicum at Rome. He is a foreign member of the British Academy. The Medieval Academy of America, and The American Academy of Arts and Sciences In 1926 he founded the Institute of Medieval Studies in Toronto, of which he has since been president.
