



He said that the school pro-vided all the religious instruction noon. that the boys needed; that no special regulation could be made for Catholies.' If the Catholic boys were permitted to go to Mass, boys of other religious beliefs should likewise be given the privilege to attend their respective churches.

"It was pointed out that, in this particular matter of religious practice, the status of Catholic boys was

not the same as that of Protestant beys The services, though called non-sectarian, were in reality Pro-testant and were all that Protestant boys of their parents demanded. Ca-tholic boys could not in conscience take part in such religious exercises.
