PROTEST SENT TO PRESIDENT ON MEXICO

Large Sodality in Elmira Voices Indignation in Two-Fold Resolution

Elmira—Formal protest on the existing condition of anti-Christian tyranny in Mexico was made last week by the Sodality of Our Lady of St. Patrick's Church, here to the United States Government through the President of the United States.

Resolutions adopted by the largest women's and girls' organization of its type in the Diocese are couched in the form of a two-fold resolution which reads as follows:

"I. Resolved: That in keeping with the fundamental concept of the Catholic Church that we are all members of the Mystical Body of Christ and that consequently, when one member thereof suffers, the whole body of the faithful, whose Head is Christ Himself, likewise suffer, we offer to our neighbors and friends and fellow-members in Holy Faith, the Mexican people, our heartfelt sympathy and the sincere promise of our prayers and organized effort to help, if possible, in the alleviation of their unjust sufferings and persecution for their admirable fidelity to their Holy Faith. We join with them in their determination to defend their right to freedom of worship, their right to educate their children in the Christian faith if they so desire, their right to maintain their spiritual loyalty to His Holiness, Pope Pius XI, realizing that thereby they are better citizens to the State because of the holiness of life, such spiritual loyalty demands. Resolved, furthermore, that the Sodality of Our Lady of St. Patrick's Church, Elmira, offer to our Mexican neighbors, especially the suffering mothers and daughters of that spiritually unhappy land, our firm declaration of the right to establish and maintain in any State or under any form of government schools and universities wherein the precious doctrines of the Faith established by Our Lord Jesus Christ true Son of God and the Redeemer of this world, shall be guarded and imparted to the children and youth of parents who themselves prize their Faith as their dearest possession.

"II. Resolved: That in view of these abiding sentiments among the large membership of this organization, the Sodality of Our Lady of St. Patrick's Church send to the President of the United States, Mr. Franklin Delano Roosevelt, and through him to other proper authorities in governmental power in the United States, the two following protests:

"First, against the alleged misplaced sympathy for Socialistic domination on the part of the present Ambassador from the United States to Mexico, Mr. Josephus Daniels, for the reason that recently he, a public servant of this country of which we also are accredited and devoted citizens, did in public utterance apparently endorse the Mexican Government's program for the removal of religious instruction from educational plans for all Mexican schools, both public and private.

"Secondly, against the reigning spirit of tyranny against the Christian faith which is being encouraged and developed in Mexico in an effort to make religion a State-controlled influence when it should be the free and unhampered possession of all the people of any country and especially a country so close to us as Mexico and a country wherein the vast majority of citizens prize their possession of the Christian Faith as above all other gifts."

New York—Sisters of St. Joan of Arc, organized to work and pray for priests, have taken the place of the Sisters of Charity at St. Joseph's Seminary, Dunwoodie. For 38 years, the Sisters of Charity attended devotedly to the material needs of the faculty and students of St. Joseph's Seminary. Upon their retirement, their work has been taken up by a community whose particular vocation is performing the household duties in seminaries, community houses, rectories, etc. Devotedness to the priests and students for the priesthood is the purpose of the Sisters of St. Joan of Arc.
