CIVIC CENTER GETS TOTAL OF 2757 MEMBERS

Archbishop Mooney Commends All Who Gave To Success of Campaign

In an enthusiastic manifestation of community cooperation especially striving for youth betterment, the Columbus Civic Center drive was brought to a successful close, Monday evening at the final report meeting which showed 2,757 memberships gained for 138 per cent of the quota.

Expressing as Bishop of Rochester and as President of the Board of Directors of the Columbus Civic Center, his very deep appreciation to all who had contributed to the success of the campaign, the Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney, stressed as one of the fine features of the campaign, the evidence of cooperation existing between the character building agencies of Rochester. He commended the helpful community spirit that exists in the city.

The Archbishop stated the obligation felt by those in charge of the Columbus Civic Center in seeing to it that every member added to the roster will receive full value of membership, physically, intellectually and morally that can be had from memberships of this kind. He expressed especial pleasure that memberships will be provided for the underprivileged boy and girl who will enjoy the full advantages of the Center on an absolutely the same level as any other membership.

Presiding at the meeting was Harry B. Crowley, general chairman. Speakers included Tobias Roth of the J. Y. M. A., City Judge Jacob Gitelman, Arthur T. Charity, "Knot Hole Gang" leader; Walter "Rabbit" Marville, and George "Specs" Toporcer, Red Wings manager.

As reports were made, Grand Knight Dr. Walter B. O'Neill presented valuable prizes to success workers in gaining members.

First to report was the special committee that was headed by Safety Commissioner Walter P. Cox. Reporting for Commissioner Cox, George C. Donahue announced that this committee had brought in 1,138 members. The women's divisions reported 604 members, for 113 per cent of quota and the men's divisions 1,025 for 178 per cent.

Division standings at the close of the drive were: Mrs. Robert C. Hartman, 162, 188 per cent; Mrs. Joseph R. Kaseman, 180, 127 per cent; Mrs. Frank J. G. Connor, 131, 120 per cent; Mrs. Harold Dorsey, 121, 95 per cent; J. Emmett O'Brien, 100, 100 per cent; William F. Hohman, 125, 128 per cent; Honning Beck, 381, 200 per cent; E. Howard Kannan, 359, 201 per cent. Harry Murphy, men's division leader received the men's reports.

Division leaders and team captains received the many valuable prizes donated. Duane Feller was high captain in the men's divisions with 373 per cent of his quota. In the women's group, Mrs. Charles Howe reported 310 per cent, having obtained 68 members through her own efforts.

At the close of the drive tribute was paid to Executive Secretary William T. Nolan and his staff and to Physical Director Wilbur E. Quinn and staff.

Synod Called For Dec. 12th In Cathedral

A Synod for the Diocese of Rochester will be held in St. Patrick's Cathedral, Wednesday, Dec. 12 beginning at 10 o'clock, with the Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney, Bishop of Rochester officiating. It is announced at the Chancery Office today.

The Diocesan Synod, according to Canon Law, is to be held at least every ten years. The Diocesan Synod is defined by Pope Benedict XIV in his book "De Synodo Dioecessana" as follows: "A lawful assembly convoked by the bishop, in which he gathers together the priests and clerics of his diocese and all others who are bound to attend it, for the purpose of doing and deliberating concerning what belongs to the pastoral care."

Those who attend the Synod are, the vicar-general; the canons of the cathedral or the diocesan consultors; the rector of the diocesan seminaries; the vicars-foranes or deans and priests of the diocese.

Details of the ceremonial for the Synod will be announced later.

Fr. Curtin Directs Clyde's Sale Of Christmas Seals

Clyde—The Rev. Joseph V. Curtin, pastor of St. John's Church, is in charge of the sale of Christmas seals in Clyde. Proceeds of the sale are apportioned towards the support of Wayne County Health Camp. Father Curtin has been Clyde's director in the Wayne County Health Association since its reorganization meeting last April.

Final figures on the church fair conducted during the last week in October will show a net profit of approximately \$2,200. The gross was a few hundred more. Considering economic conditions, the fair compared favorably with the last one the church conducted in the 1929 boom days, when \$3,700 was netted. The proceeds will be used for current expenses and debt service.

The St. John's School troop of Boys Scouts continues to be one of the most active in Wayne County. Their latest project is the formation of a drum corps. Basketball also occupies the boys' attention, they having the use of the town gymnasium during certain hours. During the Thanksgiving period the boys' sold shares in a turkey sale to raise funds.

Clyde lost his oldest resident and St. John's parish its oldest member to the death Nov. 22 of Mr. Johanna Connelly Miller, 96. Mrs. Miller attributed her longevity to the fact that she led a good Christian life. Her funeral was conducted in the church Saturday, Nov. 24, by Father Curtin. The Rev. John Guy of Geneva, a Clyde boy, was in the sanctuary. Miss Katherine Scott played the organ in place of the regular organist, Mrs. Flora Madden, one of Mrs. Miller's grand-daughters. Sister Mary Helena sang "Sabat Mater."
