How and What To Serve - Hints For the Housewife - By Molly Goss

"When in doubt, serve lamb" might well be the slogan of the housewife. Lamb of excellent quality is available all year and differs from beef in that all portions are tender enough to roast or broil. It may also be served in many other satisfactory ways, and the left overs can be utilized to advantage. The "fell" of lamb is the thin papery covering on the outside. Researches conducted by domestic science experts show that this thin covering does not affect the flavor in any way, and that the leg of lamb keeps its shape better and cooks in less time if the fell is not removed. The shoulder, saddle, and chops are improved if the fell is removed. To roast a leg of lamb, wash and sprinkle it with salt and pepper; place it on a rack in an open roasting pan with the skin side down and the cut side up. If the fat covering the meat is thin, lay strips of bacon across the top. Do not add water. Place the roaster in a real hot oven and sear for 30 minutes; then reduce the temperature to that of a moderate oven and continue roasting until done. Allow 20 to 25 minutes per pound for cooking. Vegetables and fruits, such as pared white or sweet potatoes, squash, carrots, parsnips, sliced pineapple and apricots are delicious when cooked with a leg of lamb. The cooked left-over meat may be sliced and heated in the gravy and served in mashed potato or rice border with canned green peas; or it may be cut up and cooked in a curry sauce and served with steamed rice, or scalloped with macaroni and tomato sauce and bread crumbs. It may also be made into a savory stew with carrots, onions, potatoes and celery seasoning, or chopped and made into cakes or croquettes.

Recommended Recipes

Candle Salad Peel bananas and cut in halves; roll in lemon juice so they will not turn dark. When ready to serve, place each half of banana on a crisp lettuce leaf. Put some Mayonnaise Dressing on the lettuce and a peanut or half almond in the top of the banana. When serving on the table, light the peanut of nut. Another nice way is to put some whipped cream on the top of the banana and a piece of marzipan cherry on the top. Tuna Fish Croquettes Add 3-4 cup of thick white sauce to 2 cups flaked, canned tuna fish. Season to taste with salt, pepper, and 2 teaspoons of lemon juice. Cool, shape, dip in beaten egg and roll in bread crumbs or cornmeal and cook in deep hot fat. Garnish with parsley and serve with a little white sauce spread over the top of each.

president, presided at the meeting and introduced the speakers. Commending the large gathering of women for their willingness to aid the organization, the Rev. Leo C. Mooney, moderator of the Council, said the primary motive of the drive is spiritual—to maintain Catholic principles.

"Why Every Catholic Woman Should be a Member of the N.C.C.W." was forcibly presented by Miss A. Hec Kirk. Citing the Legion of Devotion Campaign against immoral motion pictures, anti-birth control movement, and the Oregon State School case as examples of what "united effort" can do, Miss Kirk urged all the women to go out and work for the worthy cause of Catholic Action. "Since the Catholic Church has never erred in matters of faith or morals," Miss Kirk said, "we know we are asking people to belong to an organization that is certain and firm in its principles."

Need for organization and individual affiliation was pointed out by Mrs. Richard Fitzharris, Rochester Diocesan president, N.C.C.W. in a talk on "Membership." Mrs. M. H. Keogh briefly traced the history of the society from its organization in 1919 by the Bishops of the United States, to the present day. "The N.C.C.W. provides a medium through which the Catholic women of the country may speak and act as a unit when the welfare of the Church or of the country demands such expression," Mrs. Keogh said.
