

SCOUTING MERIT IS RECOGNIZED BY AWARDS MADE AT SCOUTERS' DINNER

An audience of 500 including Scoutmasters, Troop Committeemen and guests representing various civic and religious groups, were present at the annual scouters' dinner of Rochester Council, Boy Scouts of America in Bausch and Lomb Optical Company dining room last Thursday evening to witness awarding of scouting's highest honor.

The occasion gave evidence of the increasing interest being shown in the Boy Scout movement by all groups in the city interested in character development.

A citation for heroism was made to Jack Baybutt of Troop 81 and was presented by Dr. Samuel Stabins. Young Baybutt saved a girl's life in the Hudson River on Aug. 12 by towing her to safety when her strength gave out in the middle of the river.

The Silver Beaver, held by only 12 Rochesterians in the history of Scouting here and indicative of unusual executive work in scouting was presented to M. Herbert Eisenhart, president of Rochester Council, and Harry W. Bloss, scout commissioner.

Of only slightly less importance, the Scoutmaster's Key, offered by Clarence Robinson, significant of scoutmaster's consistent efforts to add to his own knowledge for the benefit of the troop, went to Fred Raets, scoutmaster of Troop 60; William B. Platt, Troop 53; John C. Vanderkolk, Troop 42; and Hugo May, Troop 21. These presentations were made by Herman M. Cohn, Vice President of the Rochester Council.

Awards for veterans in scouting included twenty-two to five-year veterans and eight to those ten years in service. Howard Josperson of Troop 52 was honored for 15 years service and the following three for 20 years: Sinclair Tebo, Troop 4; Jack Williams, Troop 20; and Edwin C. Roworth, Troop 89.

Titled a talk on intercollegiate sport, the address of Lloyd Paul Jordan, coach of Amherst College football team carried an inspirational message to men engaged in development of youth. Apt stories were used by the speaker to bring out his methods of developing the better side of boys' natures.

Mayor Stanton presented the Eagle awards to 60 scouts among whom was Jesse Yockel, of Knights of Columbus Troop, No. 141.

William Fay, Manager of WHAM, acted as toastmaster and presented a program of entertainment.
