

ROCHESTER HOLY NAME PROTESTS U.S. INTERFERENCE IN MEXICO

Holy Name Deanery Delegates Adopt Resolution Following Address By Judge Donnelly

Plan Distribution of Resolution Among Societies For Individual Protest; Elect Shlesinger Head of New Set of Officers in Deanery

Calling upon the United States government to cease interference in Mexican affairs, the Rochester Deanery of the Holy Name Union adopted an emphatic resolution on the Mexican situation at their quarterly meeting held Tuesday, January 28, in Immaculate Conception auditorium.

Delegates from each Holy Name Society in Monroe County met to elect officers and review their 1934 activities. Judge Donnelly, former county judge, the following resolution was adopted: "We believe the people of Mexico are fully capable of governing themselves without the intervention of any foreign power. We believe they are entitled to the same rights and freedom as we enjoy in this country. We believe that the United States government should not interfere in the internal affairs of Mexico.
