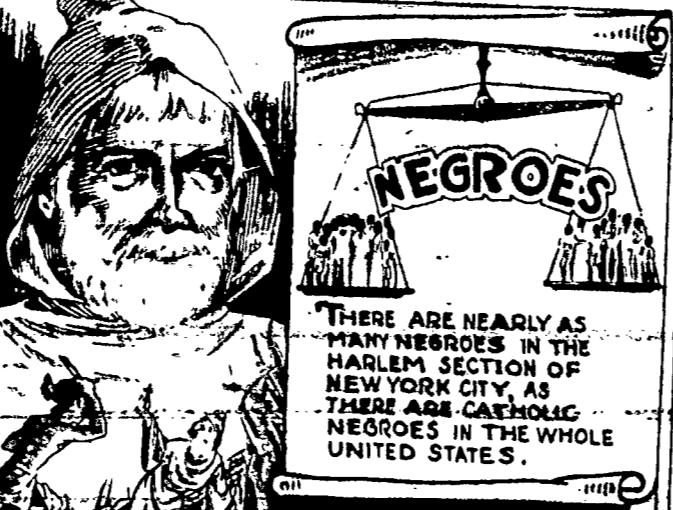

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COMMISSIONER COX ASKS MOTORISTS COOPERATE WITH TRAFFIC BUREAU

Calling upon every driver of an automobile or truck to cooperate with the new Traffic Violations Bureau to be opened March 18, Commissioner Walter Cox issued a statement this week giving reasons for establishment of such a bureau. Commissioner Cox says: "On Feb. 11 the City Council adopted amendments to the Traffic Ordinance relative to parking of automobiles, buses and other vehicles on our city streets. In establishing the new Traffic Violations Bureau in the Police Bureau, it is the aim of the Council to have all violators of motor vehicle ordinances appear at the bureau and being held under arrest, not to receive the same punishment and none to receive favoritism. Under the old system of tagging a violator was ordered to appear at the Traffic Bureau within 24 hours and make his excuse for the violation. Very rarely was he ever sent to Police Court and fined.

Faithful in Ireland Are Warned Against Communist Pledges

DUBLIN (COWC)—There has been read in all the churches of Dundalk and in the churches of Ronsdale, Blackrock, Harrogate, Lown, Droimick and Faughart, a statement, strongly warning the people, especially the unemployed, made upon their Faith and the cause of offering a solution of unemployment, by Communist associations. The statement made a particular reference to the self-styled Irish Republican Congress movement on its own admission a Communist movement. "It hopes by arrogating to itself a title, which it has no right to claim, to pass muster as a lawful political movement," the statement adds. "You can't be a Republican and a Catholic, and you can't be a Communist and a Catholic."

Under the regulations of the new ordinance, he will be summoned to appear within 48 hours at the new Traffic Violations Bureau, which will be located at headquarters building, 137 Exchange Street, thereby waiving appearance in court, and his or her case will be taken care of by the clerk in charge of the bureau. Under the terms of the ordinance the violator will be fined one dollar for the first offense, one dollar for the second offense, two dollars for the third offense, and if he is brought in the fourth time within the calendar year, he will be compelled to go before the judge in Criminal Court. A great deal of stilly and consideration has been given to this method of punishing traffic law violators. The administration feels that 95 per cent of all motorists are conscientious and obey the traffic laws. The other 5 per cent are the ones who are constant violators and cause traffic delays. We are interested and anxious to move traffic for the benefit of all motorists, and if a reasonable time limit is provided for motorists to serve their cases, there would be no room for every one who abuses the privilege. I mean the ones who think only of themselves, the ones who find a space and probably park all day—these are the drivers we want to punish."
