 the Church of St. Anthony of Padua, in the Bronx, and later was named pastor of St. Joseph's Church, an office he was filling when he was named Bishop of Omaha on March 20, 1929.

In 1923, Bishop Rummel directed the campaign for clothing and food for the poor of Germany and Austria, an effort which resulted in more than 12,000 half-sack cases of necessities being shipped to those countries. This campaign was encouraged by the Holy Father, who was deeply moved by the post-war suffering of the people. In recognition of his labors in this cause, Pope Pius appointed Bishop Rummel a Papal Chamberlain. At the time this honor came to Bishop Rummel, he was presented with a piece of St. Mary's Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, of which he was president.

The Eminence Patrick Cardinal Hayes, Archbishop of New York, officiated at the consecration of Bishop Rummel in St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York, on May 29, 1928. The Most Rev. Thomas E. Molloy, Bishop of Brooklyn, and the late Most Rev. John J. Dunn, Auxiliary Bishop of New York, were co-consecrators. Cardinal Hayes also presided at the installation of Bishop Rummel in Omaha on July 4, 1928.

In November, 1930, when the General Meeting of the Archbishops and Bishops of the United States decided to select seven members of the Hierarchy to assist the members of the Administrative Committee of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, Bishop Rummel was one of those chosen. When the Administrative Committee organized, immediately following the General Meeting of the Bishops, Bishop Rummel was assigned to the office of Assistant Episcopal Chairman of the Department of Lay Organizations, a post he has held ever since.

In 1930, Bishop Rummel was host to the brilliantly successful Sixth National Eucharistic Congress. Two years later, in September, 1932, he was host to the National Council of Catholic Charities.

A splendid orator, in addition to being an able administrator, Bishop Rummel has spoken vigorously and effectively on the stage and screen and against all influences tending to undermine the home and at the same time has actively promoted positive, constructive Catholic Action.

Archbishop Rummel came to Rochester in October 1931 to attend the national convention of the National Council of Catholic Men and was a member of the Catholic Conference on Industrial Problems near Members of the Catholic Central Union of America here as Archbishop Rummel was formerly secretary of the National Council of Catholic Charities in the New York State Branch of that organization.

The Most Rev. John J. Mitty, who succeeds Archbishop Hanna, issued a statement in which he said "News of the resignation of the Most Reverend, Edward J. Hanna, Archbishop of San Francisco, because of the infirmities of advancing age will be received with deep regret by all classes of citizens. It will leave a sense of irreplaceable loss because of a prominent and unique position he has held in both Church and State for so many years.

"Archbishop Hanna devoted his entire priestly career in the East to the ecclesiastical seminary at Rochester to the work of training candidates for the priesthood. Thousands of Catholic clergy throughout the country recall with pride and gratitude the guidance, training, patience, kindness and courtesy which they received from him and which have helped to form them into loyal Americans and zealous ministers of the Church. Ordinarily the work of educating ecclesiastical students brings little fame, but his quiet intelligence, broad scholarship, attractive character and kindly personality made Dr. Hanna known far beyond the field of his immediate work.

The University of California conferred the honorary degree Doctor of Laws upon Archbishop Hanna in 1931, and that same year he received the American Hebrew Award as the most distinguished American citizen of the year. **Moral Standards For Evaluating Movies Fitness**

The following standards or principles for evaluating the moral fitness of motion pictures will be helpful to all members of the Legion of Decency.

The campaign of the Legion of Decency must necessarily be one of education and information about the moral fitness of motion pictures. This is evident in the very nature and wording of the pledge:

"I HEREBY PROMISE TO REMAIN AWAY FROM ALL MOTION PICTURES EXCEPT THOSE WHICH DO NOT OFFEND DECENCY AND CHRISTIAN MORALITY."

It is obviously unreasonable to expect the singer to keep his pledge without the requisite information. Heretofore we are printing the moral code which was drawn up by the Rev. Daniel A. Lutz, S. J., and adopted by the moving picture industry in 1931.

**MORAL CODE FOR MOVIE GOERS**

"The problem of morality in a nation picture film is exactly the same problem that one finds in literature or the stage. Fundamentally the rules are the same.

"One must not confuse through a novel, a play or a film, the question of what is right and what is wrong. When immorality is presented as a justified course of conduct, when virtue is presented as ridiculous, when crime is approved (whether that be murder, burglary, racketeering or suicide), or when the just law is attacked and made absurd, the presentation is immoral and wrong.

"The same thing is true when virtue is laughed at and made ridiculous, and immorality is presented as funny and amusing.

"One must not present vice or crime in such a fashion as to stimulate the passions, arouse evil thoughts, or teach people how to commit similar crimes.

"Even if in the end the immoral person is punished and the gangster goes to his doom, the picture (as well as the novel or play) may still be evil for when the vice is presented in a stimulating and attractive fashion or the gangster is shown as a charming, charming, charming, generous, the climax of punishment will not be sufficient to eradicate the stimulation and the appeal of the earlier sections.

"Hence, scenes that stimulate passion arouse evil thoughts, or teach crime will vitiate and make immoral an otherwise satisfactory picture.

"These cases can be clearly and easily decided—there are all sorts of shades or presentation that admit of difference of opinion.

**Adults and Children**

"Scenes that may charm, excite and stimulate a young person, may have no effect upon an adult. The qualities of motion pictures will be helpful to all members of the Legion of Decency.

"People with firm grounding in ethics and a complete knowledge of the fundamentals of right and wrong may not be shaken in their standards by even a brilliant defense of vice or a clever attack upon morality.

"Temperaments may be so different that two people looking at the same picture for reading the same novel are affected in entirely different ways.

"All accounts for the discrepancies one finds in the classification of novels, plays, and pictures that are not clearly based on wholly good. Yet when one is waging a campaign like that of the Legion of Decency, someone must take the lead. Someone must make the ultimate and final decisions, and the rest must bend their judgment for the sake of the cause in hand.

"Class A pictures are in the main wholly good. Class C pictures are either of the two ways explained above. Class B are certainly not wholly evil, nor are they clearly good. Temperaments and tastes and training and age will make all the difference in the viewpoint of those who see them. So the leaders chosen to determine the lists must make the decisions and ask for the co-operation of the rest."
