CATHOLIC CHARITIES MAKES REPORT FOR FAMILY WELFARE DEPARTMENT

Annual report of the Family Welfare Department of the Rochester Catholic Charities, issued this week by Kathleen O'Leary, Executive Director, emphasizes the satisfactory results which three and one-half years of combining the functions of a unit of the Public Welfare Department and those of an agency of private charity have produced in the work of the Catholic Charities. The report lists the number of families receiving substantial relief, and indicates the nature of the aid provided. It also makes acknowledgment of gifts and assistance of various kinds bestowed by organizations and individuals to further the work of the Catholic Charities.

The Report submitted by Miss O'Leary follows:
 April 1, 1934, number of families receiving relief for services 872
 Number of families accepted for major care service during the year 817
 Of these, 418 were families not previously known to agency and 399 had been previously known.

At the annual meeting of the Legal Aid Society, held Monday, Mr. Joseph P. MacSweeney was unanimously re-elected president. Honorable George S. Van Schick, State Superintendent of Insurance, was elected president of the Society for many years. Mr. MacSweeney is president of the Society. Mr. Van Schick has long been active in legal aid work and is Chairman of the committee on Legal Aid of the State Bar Association.

Other officers elected were Mrs. Charles V. Dodge, vice-president; Attorney Don C. Allen, treasurer; and Attorney Emory E. Brownell, secretary. The following persons were elected to serve as directors for a term of three years: Harry E. Crowley, Mrs. John J. Flinn, Alfonso Gioia, Dr. Leonard Jones and Mrs. Arthur Sutherland Jr.

Mr. Brownell as Executive Attorney reported that he had handled 140 cases during the month of March of which the bulk were wage claims and domestic relations problems. He reported that the Society had handled 277 cases during the month. Leland Yost as public defender reported that he had handled 20 cases during the month of March of which he was able to dispose of 14.

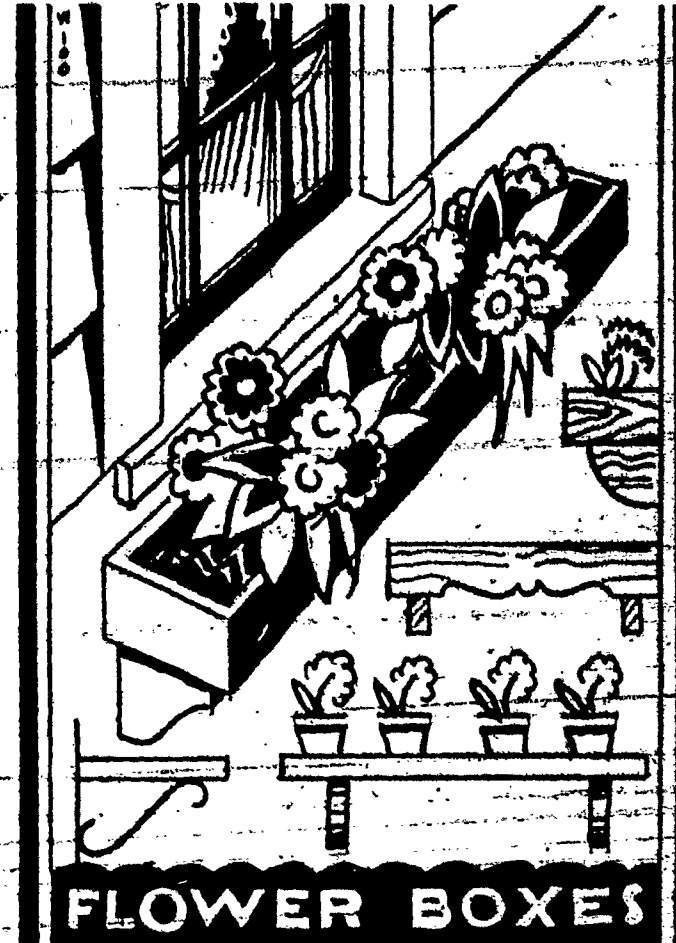

FLOWER BOXES

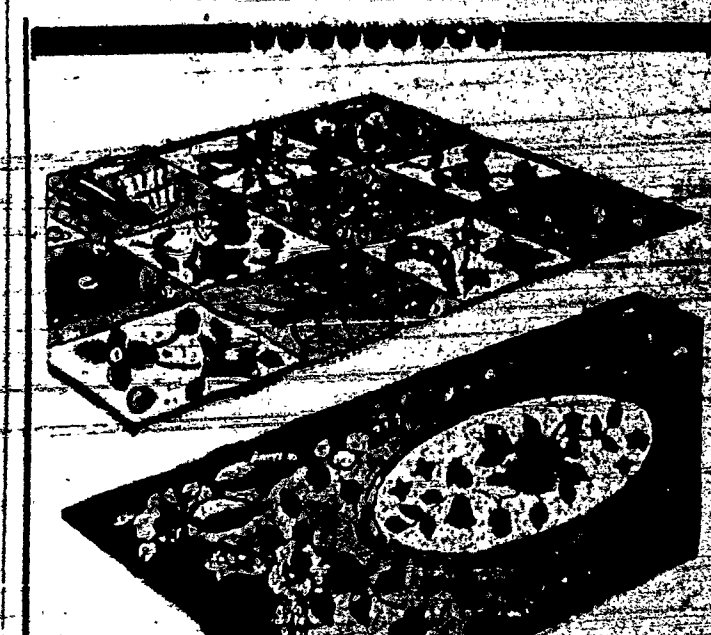
