CATHOLIC CHARITIES MAKES REPORT FOR FAMILY WELFARE DEPARTMENT

Annual report of the Family Welfare Department of the Rochester Catholic Charities, issued this week by Kathleen O'Leary, Executive Director, emphasizes the satisfactory results which three and one-half years of combining the functions of a unit of the Public Welfare Department and those of an agency of private charity have produced in the work of the Catholic Charities. The report lists the number of families receiving substantial relief, and indicates the nature of the aid provided. It also makes acknowledgment of gifts and assistance of various kinds bestowed by organizations and individuals to further the work of the Catholic Charities. The Report submitted by Miss O'Leary follows: April 1, 1934, number of families receiving relief for services... 872 Number of families accepted for major care service during the year... 817 Of these, 418 were families not previously known to agency and 399 had been previously known.

The fact that this plan has worked out harmoniously for three and one-half years, to the benefit of both the Public Department, i. e., saved the over-head expense of an additional Unit, and to the Private Agency, i. e., enabled to do a much larger volume of work than would be possible otherwise, is certainly a very creditable record for the Staffs of both the Public and Private Agencies, and also for the three Commissioners of Public Welfare under whom the plan has worked satisfactorily.

One of the functions of the Family Department of Rochester Catholic Charities is its Protective work for girls and women. This Department gave long time care to 104 mothers of infants born out of wedlock during the year, and supervised and directed 15 others. An additional visitor was appointed to give special care to pre-delinquent adolescents and also to young girls married from the Institution, Westfield Farm at Bedford.

Special thanks are due to our Patrons and the Religious in all the Institutions who co-operated so fully in making our services possible and helpful to those in need. Especially should be mentioned the Sisters of St. Mary's Hospital, to whom the Family and Children's Division of Catholic Charities has never turned in vain. Very great assistance has been rendered by The Department of Catholic Education The Sisters and Children of the Catholic Secondary Schools and Colleges The Fraternal and other Catholic Organizations The Flower League for its exquisite hand-made layettes The Catholic Youth Association of the Civic Center for many free memberships in gymnasium and swimming classes. Mr. Brownell as Executive Attorney reported that he had handled 240 cases during the month of March of which the bulk were wage claims and domestic relations problems. Mr. Brownell also reported that he had handled 20 cases during the month of March of which he was able to dispose of 14.

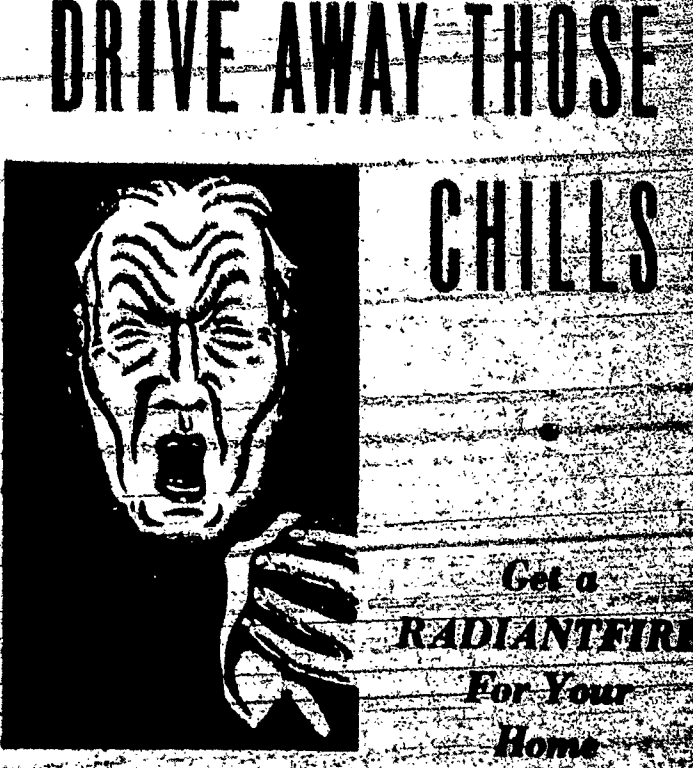

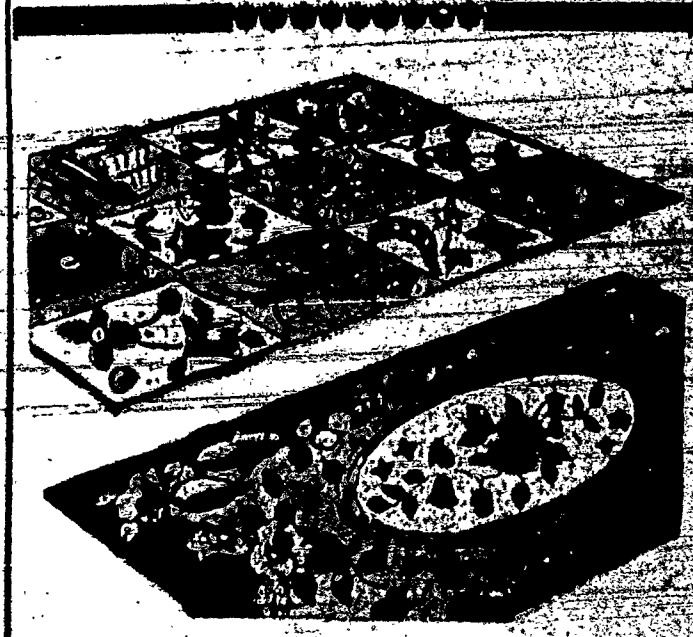
