CATHOLIC CHARITIES GIVES REPORT FOR CHILD WELFARE DEPARTMENT

Service rendered in three divisions is recorded in the annual report of the Child Welfare Department, issued by Miss Kathleen O'Leary, Executive Director. The report is Diocesan Director of the Rochester Catholic Charities.

In the report statistics are given of the work done for children in foster homes, for the Diocesan Orphan Homes, and with families requesting placement in institution or foster homes, but whom Rochester Catholic Charities is able to assist in making a place without removing the children from the family group.

The report submitted by Miss O'Leary follows:

The work of the Child Welfare Department falls into three sections:

Children in Foster Homes: Extract from annual report forwarded to State Department of Social Welfare in accordance with the State Charities Law. Under care January 1, 1934, 165 Accepted for placement, 78 Total in Foster Homes, 243 Discharged from supervision 60 Remained in care 1/1/35, 183 Of these children 10 were in boarding homes, 47 in free homes, and 23 in opportunity homes (some duplication due to transfers). 1 c, 12 children transferred from foster homes to free homes with a view to legal adoption.

The second division of Rochester Catholic Charities Service for the Diocesan Orphan Asylum. Investigations were made in connection with all applications for admission or discharge. The Department also assisted in replacing 37 children with parent or guardian.

The third section of work in this Department is case work with families requesting placement in institution or foster home, but whom Rochester Catholic Charities is able to assist in making a plan without removing the children from the family group.

122 such applications were received and given case work treatment covering either a few days or a long time plan. In some cases children were boarded temporarily with relatives, housekeepers were provided to keep the home intact; religious, economic, or legal aid arranged to adjust marital or other difficulties; and hospital or dispensary care planned.

In order to find desirable homes for children, 290 new homes were investigated during the year, and 65 accepted as suitable for the needs of our children.	

3,872 visits were made in the interest of children in foster homes, and 523 visits to hospital clinics (private physicians were called when indicated).
