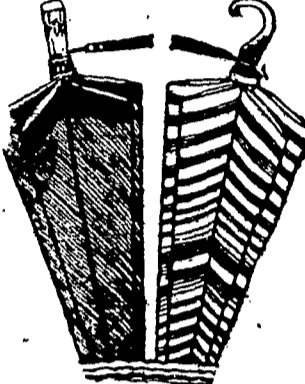

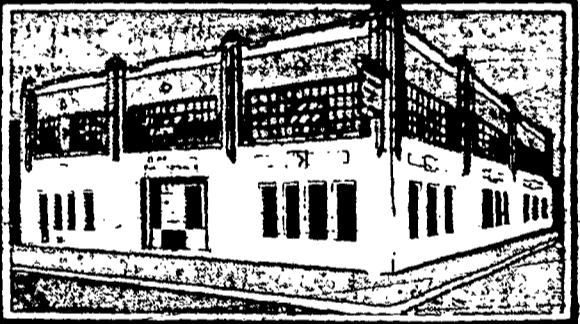

Resolutions Voice Vigorous Action Of Holy Name on Current Problems

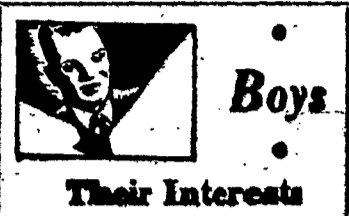
(Continued from Page One) We urge our members to interest themselves not only in Catholic education, but also in all education whether public or private.

country has been reduced to a minimum. We find no explanation for the continued efforts of the proponents of this amendment except the desire to have given to Congress the sweeping powers conferred by the amendment over persons under eighteen years of age.

We believe that to give to Congress the power to say that a child shall not work until he has reached the age of eighteen years is a dangerous departure and will be fraught with grave evils.

We urge our members to follow the lead of the ratification of this amendment by the Legislature of the State of New York, and to do all that they can to defeat its ratification.

GERMAN PERSECUTION We read with keen regret the accounts of the anti-Christian movement in Germany and the report that all religious papers are to be suppressed. We extend our sympathy to our persecuted German Catholics and to the persecuted Germans of all religious faiths. We hope that the German government will take immediate steps to correct these abuses.

We urge our members to pray that there may be restored to the German people the right which all free people should enjoy, namely, the right to worship God as their consciences dictate.

LENDING LIBRARIES We direct the attention of our members to the growing evil of the commercial lending library. In a large majority of these places are some books and periodicals, exposed upon the shelves or counters, that contain obscene matter, lascivious pictures, illustrations and advertisements, and in many instances are of the most outrageous, indecent, disgusting and disgraceful character. In other words, dirty and filthy books—pernicious periodicals are being circulated and sold in some lending libraries and other stores and news stands in a degree and manner that is shocking to the public conscience.

We suggest that the individual Holy Name Societies investigate in their neighborhood the material lent by these libraries. We recommend that our societies take such action as the parents see fit to demand and that they report to the secretary of the Union the action that they have taken.

MODERNIZE NOW!

CONCRETE STEPS The first place in the house to wear out and decay is the flight of outside wooden steps. Why not recast them with concrete steps? They are safe, non-slippery in wet weather, and last indefinitely. They are easily kept clean and are absolutely rot-proof.

Simple forms for building them are shown in the drawing on this page. Either 1-inch or 2-inch lumber may be used for forms, whichever is available.

Concrete should be of a rather stiff consistency and contain sufficient mortar to produce smooth, even surfaces. Finish with a wood float as shown.

Former Rochester Newswriter Tells of Mexico Persecution

(Continued from Page One) was seized into dropping his project at least overtly.

Later, the article says, Basola and Calleja got together and plotted the socialistic education scheme which Calleja later put through. This scheme is described as "merely a variation and extension of the disputed sex educational plan."

As evidence that the persecution of religion proved needless by the circumstances in some of the states, Mr. Murray quotes from an article written by a representative of the New York Times, who described conditions in Nuevo Leon in December, 1934. None of the churches in the state had been closed, the article said, and the law limiting priests to 200 for every 2,000 inhabitants is not enforced, and there is no evidence of any attempt on the part of clergy or laity to take advantage of the relative freedom they enjoy.

"Why not," Mr. Murray asks, "adopt the same policy throughout Mexico? Unquestionably, in view of the present oscillatory mood of the churches and their manifest anxiety to keep out of trouble the same result would follow."

Concluding his article, Mr. Murray says: "Unquestionably, the church is being made a seepage by a government which must have one must, because it has failed to carry out its positive pro-revolution promises. There is no evidence that the Government plans to lighten its attack on religion and the clergy. There is increasing evidence that the people themselves are becoming more alert and more antagonistic toward the oppressors of their church."

"Perhaps the Government will awaken to and change its attitude," he writes.

"But there is at present no evidence whatsoever that the religious persecution is likely to be stopped."
