

to teachers to interest youth in library work, so that Catholics may be able to compete with Protestants in public and secular libraries.

To increase knowledge and to provide books that satisfy the desire to learn. Neither can they live and grow on alone. There must be more books in the home, more books in the public libraries and more books in the schools. Schools and libraries are not national competitors, but national allies.
