Elmira Deanery Doings

By WILLIAM STOWELL, JR. Dr. McGuire Speaks

Elmira—The Rev. Owen B. McGuire, D. D., of Rochester, one of the foremost scholars in the country, and for many years a professor at St. Bernard's Seminary, was the principal speaker at the regular monthly meeting of the Elmira Deanery, National Council of Catholic Women, Thursday evening, May 9, at the Dunn Memorial building of St. Joseph's Hospital.

Miss Mary A. Newsome presided at the meeting and reported on the quarterly meeting of the Diocesan Council, Board of Directors at Ithaca, N. Y., recently.

Dr. McGuire, a widely recognized authority on the Carmelite Order, and on the lives of St. Theresa of Avila and St. Theresa of Lisieux, spoke on these subjects. He has drawn his knowledge from a practical and actual source, having made an extensive study of the Carmelites in Spain for several years. St. Theresa of Avila, in Spain, was the founder of the Discalced Carmelites. Dr. McGuire has drawn his research work in France where he made a study of the life of St. Theresa of Lisieux, one of the recent Carmelites to be canonized.

The latter Theresa is popularly known in America as "The Little Flower," although her title in Europe is "Little Theresa." Dr. McGuire's talk was both interesting and practical, as he portrayed Little Theresa as a human being on our own level. He especially emphasized her remarkable patience and humility. Only 15 years old when she entered the "cloister," she was unaccustomed to the routine and rigid process, she suffered terribly from the fact that she did not have sufficient bedding. And being naturally weak, she suffered in silence. She did not realize that she could have more bedding if she so desired.

Dr. McGuire's address was received by an enthusiastic audience. After the talk, he answered many questions.

Later in the month, Dr. McGuire will speak to Our Lady of Mount Carmel Literature Guild of Our Lady's Sodality of St. Patrick's Church.

Legal Aid Society Handled 3,739 Cases Year Report Shows

During the year ending March 31, 1935, the Legal Aid Society handled 3,739 cases, an increase of 18 over the year before and collected and saved for poor persons over \$35,500 according to its annual report just made public. Of the clients served 28 per cent were dependent upon city relief and 25 per cent were unemployed. While 11 1/2 clients were potentially dependent, 38 per cent of the money collected was for clients who were actually dependent upon city relief and to that extent reduced relief expenditures.

The report points out that the annual number of cases handled has increased 49 per cent since its 1930 report and that collections and savings for clients has increased 73 per cent. During the past 5 years the Society has handled a total of 17,682 cases and collected and saved for clients a total of \$1,488,265, an average of \$875 per case. The service was rendered at an average cost of \$2.78 per case. Aside from its economic returns the report emphasizes that legal aid service is of greater importance to the city in promoting better citizenship and higher standards among the poor and in preventing crime and dependency. In handling 483 husband and wife problems during the year much was accomplished in addition to collecting support by the salvaging of homes and the enforcement of the legal obligations of marriage and parenthood, the report reveals.

The bulk of the cases were domestic relations problems, wage claims, landlord and tenant-defendant foreclosures—defendants and that the number of non-support cases was 20 per cent smaller. All but 243 of the cases handled were disposed of during the year. In disposing of these cases the Society made 457 court appearances, held 6,940 personal interviews with witnesses and interested parties and sent 3,442 letters.
