Looking at the case from a humanitarian angle, these men and the countless thousands who support their views are perfectly correct. Our social order calls for the detention of a man who has violated the rules of society.

Answering the charge that the Albany club is using Pitts to exploit an ex-convict for box office purposes, supporters of the play point out that he is signed for \$20 a week whereas he could make many times that amount by barnstorming with an independent team.

much more so, of course, if he pretends to coddle the ball or to wind up. It is even a bait if the pitcher pretends he is on the rubber and commences to wind up. Any pretense to deceive the runner into thinking that the pitcher has the ball by making any motions preparatory to making the pitch, is a bait. The pitcher may stay out on the mound, tie his shoe laces, look at the scenery, rub his hand on an imaginary ball, etc.; but he cannot deceive by pretending to be on the rubber.

In a doubtful case of balk, it is the umpire who makes the decision. Therefore, it is poor baseball for a pitcher with a man on third to try some new and doubtful bluff. We have witnessed many called balks in the League this year and in every case the umpire was right. Boys may as well learn the intricate rules of the game now as later.

We quote from the "Commonwealth" "Citizens' Villeneuve of Quebec and Lord Baden-Powell founder of the Boy Scouts movement signed an agreement at the archbishop's palace, May 27, by which the Federation of Catholic Scouts was formally affiliated with the Boy Scouts' Association of Canada. 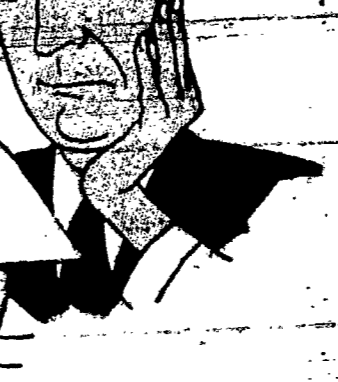
